## ACKERMAN ON COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL

State School Superintendent J. H. Ackerman, in an interview, in regard to the establishment of a county high school in Lane County, said: I have carefully looked into the proposition for establishing a County High School in Lane County, according to the county levy provided for in the County High School Law, and can say without reservation that the proposition meets with my heartiest approval. The reason for my being so much in sympathy with the plan is that it, in my mind, is the best scheme for furnishing, at a minimum expense, high school facilities for every boy and girl in the county, regardless of where they may live.

Further, it will encourage the organization of small high schools in country districts and thereby bring high school facilities much nearer the homes of the pupils. So near that in many instances the pupils can attend high school in the day time and be at home at night where they should be.

Further, that the influence of the high school will be a potent factor in encouraging the seventh and eighth grade pupils to complete their work in order that they may enter these high schools, which are provided so near home. And further that these high school centers will become centers for all literary efforts, on the part of the country people, and will serve as does the rural delivery and telephone, and other conveniences that heretofore have been enjoyed by the towns and cities.

I sincerely hope that Lane county will be the banner county in that it will take up and successfully carry out this advanced step in education.

## ABSOLUTE CURE FOR DIPHTHERIA.

Chicago, May 21.—Dr. Ernest Jenisch has sprung a surprise in medical circles by the announcement that he has discovered a treatment which is an absolute cure for diphtheria.

With this remedy which he calls "vegetable antitoxin" or lobelia, he claims to have cured 150 cases of diphtheria by administering it hypodermically.

Although lobelia is known to be a poison among physicians, Dr. Jenisch has demonstrated that it is harmless when it is used in this way. At the request of a physician attending a meeting of medical men at which he announced his discovery Jenisch injected thirty drops of the antitoxin into his body. Not one of the physicians had ever heard of the use of lobelia as a cure for diphtheria.

## ASHLAND WANTS GLYDE PAYNE AGAIN

The student body of the Normal, as a business meeting held last week, passed resolutions asking the board of regents of the Normal to re-elect President C. A. Payne. After the meeting the classes met and unanimously signed a petition which will be sent to the board. President Payne was elected to fill the unexpired term of H. F. Mulkey, and is not an applicant for the position for the coming year. He offers to put in a plant to cost not less than \$5000 to supply the city with fresh water. In return he wants a franchise for 50 years, and also asks the city to give him the site. This is the first of a series of proposals which will result from the new movement for a water works system.—Newport Mail.

## ANOTHER PROBABLE VICTIM OF MRS. GUNNESS.

La Porte, Ind., May 21.—Another name was added today to the list of supposed intended victims of Mrs. Belle Guinness when Mayor Darrow received a letter from Omaha, Neb., signed "Samuel Harvey."
