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STATE TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION

JUNE 25-27

The annual meeting of the Western division of the State Teachers' Association will be held in Eugene on June 25, 26 and 27. The program is being prepared by the presidents of the special departments. Besides the regular grammar-school departments, which consist of the primary, intermediate and advanced sections, the association maintains a department of music, a department of supervision and a department of secondary and higher education.

The officers having charge of the program have secured the services of Elwood P. Cumberly, of Stanford University; Albert Bushnell Hart, of Harvard University; Edward Hyatt, State Superintendent of Public Instruction of California; and A. C. Nelson, Superintendent of Public Instruction of Utah. Miss Effie B. McFadden, of the San Francisco Normal School, will give special instruction in primary methods. The program will provide for four sectional periods and ten general lectures.

The citizens of Eugene are preparing to give the teachers a royal reception. The following committees have been appointed: Committee on entertainment, L. R. Alderman, G. W. Hug, Cora Wold, Maude Collogly, Fannie Millican; reception committee, W. R. Dillard, Ida Patterson, Emma Chase, W. C. Lyons, E. R. Parker. The annual business meeting will be held on Friday morning, June 25, at which time the standing committees will submit their reports and the president will deliver the annual address.

THE EYE AND ITS CARE

(By Dr. Franc Lucille Hard, New Christian Block.)

In our first article upon the eye and its care a brief description of the anatomy of the eyeball will be commenced.

As all know, the eyeballs are situated in the front of the head in two hollow cavities called the orbits. The shape of these cavities is pyramidal with the apex directed inward. The walls of the orbits are of bone lined with various tissues and much fat, which forms a soft bed for the eye-ball to rest in.

In front, the eye is protected by the eyebrows, eyelids, and eyelashes. The eyebrows help keep the dust and dirt from the eye and also regulate, to a small extent, the amount of light which enters the eye. The eyelids are the shields of the eye,



and play a very important part in protecting the eyeball. Their action being involuntary as well as voluntary; they close upon the slightest danger approaching the eye. And in the act of winking, the glands which line their inner surfaces are made to secrete a solution which keeps the front of the eye moist and well lubricated. But perhaps the greatest use of the eyelids is to keep the light from the eyes when at rest, for if one was never able to close the eyes and shut out all light and motion, occasionally, think what a calamity it would be.

The eyelashes, which are rows of short curved hairs situated at the free margin of each eyelid, also help in keeping dust from entering the eye. Some times these tiny hairs grow in the wrong direction and cause much trouble by scratching and irritating the eyeball. This can generally be helped by carefully removing the offending lashes.

The above are the protectors of the eye-ball. The rotators or muscles of the eye will next be considered.

There are six muscles attached to each eyeball. The Internal Rectus muscle is situated on the nasal side of the eyeball pulling it toward the nose. The External Rectus muscle which pulls the eye toward the temple and is fastened to the temple side of the eyeball. The Superior Rectus muscle, situated on top of the eyeball pulls it upward and the Inferior Rectus muscle pulling downward, is located on the under side of the eye. There are two other muscles called the oblique muscles named from their action in pulling the eyes obliquely up and down.

Of the muscles of the eye the Internal Rectus is the strongest, the External Rectus is the longest, and the Inferior Rectus is the shortest. (To be Continued.)
