MAKE THE MAJORITY BIG

(Portland Daily Journal.)

That the State University appropriation will be sustained The Journal has never had any doubt. But the majority in favor of the University should be made very large, not only as an expression of good will toward the institution, but for the effect it will have in other and distant states.

Newspapers in all parts of the country have noticed this issue here and commented upon it, and many will be the comments paid to Oregon if the University appropriation is sustained by an overwhelming majority.

Besides, such a majority would strengthen the referendum feature of our constitution. It would show that while a comparatively few voters could compel a vote on the law, the people would not therefore reject it when it deserved to be sustained.

Some Eastern papers, eager to criticize the initiative and referendum, have pointed to this instance as commendatory of the new method of popular government, and some, the St. Paul Pioneer-Press for instance, have assumed that the successful invocation of the referendum was equivalent to the defeat of the appropriation for the University. Let the people show such ignorant or indigenous critics that calling a particular vote on a measure does not mean that the people will sustain the petitioners if they are wrong, and that the people of Oregon are ready to vote in favor of liberally supporting their State University.

In these remarks we intend no harsh criticism on those who invoked the referendum on this law. They have a perfect right to their opinion. And as to the common schools being more important for the state to care for than higher schools, we agree with them. But the University must be well sustained, too. And the appropriation is none too much.

Nor will a great majority for the appropriation be any foundation for an argument against the referendum. The campaign for and against this measure, and others, even if they are defeated, has been worth many times its cost. Thus the people are becoming better educated, and more capable of attending directly to their own affairs. And in this particular instance the people of Oregon will hereafter take a far greater interest in their University, and will have a greater sympathy with its work, and with education generally, than they have done before, or than they would have done except for this movement. So the University and its friends throughout the state need feel no animosity toward those that invoked this vote.

But don't forget to vote on this measure, and make an X between the ballot number "214" and the word "Yes." Make the majority big. It will be a good thing for the state to do so.

CAKE AND REPUBLICANS.

There is no reason under the sun why any republican should desert H. M. Calk, the republican candidate for United States Senator. Mr. Calk is the republican nominee, winning the nomination in the primaries in a clean, honest fight and he stood before the primaries, on every principle involved in his election.

He is a Republican in and with vote with the Republicans in the Senate to keep alive the excellent principles of the Roosevelt administration. He would not be an obstructionist, opposing everything republican and standing as a barrier to the progress now being made by the dominant party in congress.

Oregon will sound the keynote of the presidential election and as usual the nation is waiting for results from Oregon. As this is a solidly republican state and as it holds an election several months prior to the presidential election in this state means much in shaping the sentiment of the presidential election.

Let every republican vote for the republican candidate, therefore, and set a pace for the presidential election.

A democrat would do Oregon no good in congress. Oregon needs legislation which only the co-operation of the strongest elements in congress was secure and a democrat standing with the minority party would have no possible means of securing this legislation.

On account of eastern prejudice and misunderstanding the northwest states are denied much that is due them. Only the co-operation and aid of the strong republican majority can possibly secure this needed legislation for irrigation, opening rivers and harbors and other improvements for the northwest states.

It would therefore be suicidal to send up a democrat. He could ask nothing, could secure nothing for his state. He could simply draw the salary and wear the title.

Let us have an honest, working delegation in congress.

NOTICE OF SALE OF WATER BONDS

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 724, passed by the common council on the 5th day of May, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 5th day of May, 1908, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city recorder in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city, or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.

That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in denominations of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will become due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city.

That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids.

That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of the act, "To re-incorporate the city of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18, 1905, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 18th day of April, 1908.

A certified check of five per cent of the amount of each bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid.
