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REPUBLICANS HOLD RALLY AT SPRINGFIELD

The Republicans had a big rally at Springfield last night, many attending from Eugene, and the Military band of this city was engaged for the occasion. L. E. Bean, candidate for representative, was the first speaker at the meeting, and he was followed by W. W. Calkins, Mr. Bean's running mate on the legislative ticket. Allen H. Eaton, Republican and Statement No. 1 candidate, then spoke. Hon. S. M. Yoran, of this city, was also on the program for an address and he delivered his usual strong speech in favor of Republican principles. The meeting was successful in every particular, and the several candidates are confident they won many friends among the audience. Eaton's remarks were of special interest because he explained his position upon Statement No. 1. He stated that he received the Democratic nomination, but that at the proper time he refused the nomination. That the so-called Statement No. 1 ticket published in the county papers was unauthorized by him, and that at his request his name had been dropped from that ticket in the papers. Mr. Eaton then requested all Republican voters, and especially Statement No. 1 Republicans, to give their support to the entire Republican legislative ticket. He asserted that the statement was not an issue at this time—that that issue had been settled at the Republican primaries.

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 734, passed by the common council on the 5th day of May, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 5th day of May, 1908, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city recorder in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city, or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.

That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in the denomination of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will become due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city.

That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe-lines, structures, and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids.

That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of the act, "To incorporate the city of Eugene, and to reorganize all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 15, 1905, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 15th day of April, 1905.

Washington, May 27.—Senator Bourne, who has been confined to his apartments the last ten days with an attack of grip, appeared in the senate today. Asked for his views on the political situation in Oregon he said:

"In the Oregon Republican primaries my position on the United States senatorial nomination was clearly defined in my interview given the Portland daily papers. I never requested by word or letter, support for any particular candidate, but confined my attention to endorsing to the people, wherever possible, an opportunity to vote for Statement No. 1 legislative candidates. TWO REPORTS UPON WOOD PULP TARIFF

(Continued From Page One.)

would seem to indicate that the temporary suspension or entire removal of the present tariff would not have any great immediate effect and if the tariff is removed at any time it should be coupled with the right of free exportation of wood pulp from the Canadian forests. The removal of the tariff on print paper and wood pulp, if followed by an export duty on pulp wood coming from Canada, would probably result in a considerable increase in the price of print paper and an early drain of the pulp wood forests of the United States. "It would seem that the publishers, to be assured of the low price for paper, should maintain mills in the United States. Any policy that would give the Canadian mills a preferential advantage over the American mills on obtaining the raw material at a low price must inevitably result in the dismantling of the American mills, and the ultimate dependence of American publishers upon Canadian mills.

"Under these conditions Canada could levy export duties on print paper that would result in enhanced prices without the presence of competition from American manufacturers."

Minority Report. The minority report endorses the Stevens bill in its entirety and recommends its passage. Discussing the issue between the publishers and paper manufacturers, the report states that an acute situation, which may be termed "trade hysteria," was precipitated in 1907 in newspaper print manufacture when a group of sixteen Wisconsin mills, known as the Wisconsin Wood Pulp Association, bought fifty thousand cords of pulp wood at Quebec, and introduced a new and unlooked-for factor into what was more or less a speculative operation, and which "demoralized the wood pulp manufacture of the United States as well as of Canada.
