HIGH SCHOOL DEBATERS TO BE BANQUETED

The Astoria and Lebanon debaters, who appear before the Eugene public on Friday night at the University in their contest for the high school championship of the state, will be banqueted by the high school league after the debate. The officers of the debating league will also be present at the banquet, as well as the judges, Superintendent Ackerman, of Salem, Superintendent Alderman and Principal Hug, of the city schools, with a number of students of the high school who are interested, the representatives of the home high schools of the two teams and several of the residents.

On Friday night Professor Ackerman, state superintendent of public instruction, will speak on the work of the league before the debate, and Hon. S. H. Friendly, chairman of the board of regents of the University, will present the silver championship cup. Several numbers of special music will also be on the program.

ABOUT THAT RAILROAD ASSESSMENT.

In a communication to the Cottage Grove Leader, Assessor Keeney calls attention to the fact that the Southern Pacific Company is now assessed \$20,000.00 per mile, but we ask, why did he not raise the assessment to \$30,000.00 per mile—the same as in Marion, Linn, and Douglas Counties?

Mr. Keeney states that he did list the S. P. Co.'s road bed at \$30,000 per mile, but that he did not succeed in getting the assessment at that figure. We ask why not? The farmers of Lane County pay the assessment made by Mr. Keeney. Why not the Railroad Company?

Why should the Southern Pacific Company be allowed to have their assessment placed at \$20,000.00, when it lists \$30,000.00.

Mr. Keeney admits, by his communication, that the S. P. Co.'s road bed should have been assessed at \$30,000.00 per mile and he has not explained to voters of Lane County, why this assessment was made at only \$20,000.00 per mile.

The difference in the assessment of the railroad bed in this county, between \$20,000.00 per mile and \$30,000.00 per mile is the sum of \$407,600 upon which the taxes are lost to Lane County, this year.

Mr. Welby Stevens of Springfield promises the voters of Lane County that if he is elected, he will raise this assessment the \$407,600.00 or more.

J. W. BAKER MAKING STRONG RUN FOR JUDGE.

For County Judge J. W. Baker is making an active canvass and reports from different parts of the county are to the effect that he will poll far more than his party strength. Mr. Baker has resided long in Lane county and is well and favorably known, having served as state game warden for one term, in which office he discharged his duties acceptably, and made an excellent record. REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

For an amendment of Section 28 (evidently intended to be Section 29) of Article IV of the Constitution, changing the compensation of members of the legislature to \$400 for each regular session and \$10 per day for each extra session instead of \$3 per day and mileage. (Section 28 provides the time when laws take effect, and the proposed amendment is, therefore, wrongly numbered.) Vote YES or NO.

For an amendment of Section 3 of Article XIV of the Constitution, to permit the location of State Institutions elsewhere than at the seat of government by act of the legislature and vote of the people. Vote YES or NO.

An amendment to Article VII of the Constitution by increasing the number of judges of the Supreme Court from three to five, until otherwise provided by law, and authorizing the Legislative Assembly to provide the appropriate legislation for the exercise by the circuit courts, and the jurisdiction theretofore exercised by the county courts, and the transaction of county business by and before some appropriate tribunal. REFERENDUM ORDERED BY PETITION OF THE PEOPLE.

An act providing that in all counties, the sheriff shall have the custody of prisoners committed to or confined in the county jail and such prisoners shall be worked at such places and for such time and in such manner as the county court may direct, and that in counties of over one hundred thousand inhabitants, the salaries of guards and jailors shall not exceed \$30.00 per month and the price of meals furnished prisoners shall be 12 1/2¢ each. Vote YES or NO.

For an act requiring railroads and other common carriers to grant free transportation to State officers and county judges and sheriffs, as a condition precedent to acquiring land for corporate purposes by the exercise of eminent domain, and to prohibit the payment of mileage for such free transportation.
