CANDIDATE WHO FIGHTS HIMSELF

Newport, Ore., May 27.—W. F. Keady of Waldport, Lincoln county, 16 miles south of Newport, who is running on the Democratic ticket as candidate for county commissioner, occupies probably one of the strangest situations in the political history of Oregon. Keady is a registered Republican who was defeated at the primaries for his party's nomination, but without any knowledge of his own, his name was written in on the Democratic ticket and to the surprise of everybody it was found that he had received the Democratic nomination. He accepted this, but nevertheless is acting as private secretary to Frank Bulker of Waldport, chairman of the Republican county central committee, and in that capacity is compelled to write and send out to the voters of the county letters urging them to vote the straight Republican ticket and defeat himself.

Keady explains his peculiar position by saying that on account of the fact that primary day was wet and rainy, only 430 of the registered Republicans of the county came out and cast their votes, and he refuses to accept the result, as expressing the will of the party. He still classes himself as a Republican, though on the Democratic ticket and says that after the election he will return to the fold. Meantime he is touring the county in an effort to offset the effect of the letters against himself, which as Bunker's secretary he is obliged to send out. He expresses himself as confident of being elected.

REV. C. A. WOOLEY ANSWERS MR. WILSON.

Editor Eugene Guard:—In your issue May 26, I notice some statements and arguments attributed to Rev. Clarence True Wilson against Woman Suffrage. By your permission, I wish to say a few words in reply, through the Guard. In the first place I do not think it is true that only a very small minority of Oregon's good women wish the ballot. I am pretty well acquainted in Western Oregon, and I do not think I hazard anything when I say that a respectable majority of them do wish the ballot. Those queens of our homes would love to become full fledged citizens. Mr. Wilson's statement to the effect that there are not four other states in the union as corrupt politically as Colorado, Idaho, Wyoming and Utah, is not true, barring the last named state, where the hierarchy and polygamy of the Mormon church has blighted and hindered every effort at moral reform, from the 1st settlement of the territory and state. It is not justified by either facts or figures. And to make such a statement without an effort to prove it; save the one thing that he knew instances in which women had bartered their virtue for office, is to beg the question most piteously. Does not he, and everybody else know, that degraded women sell their virtue in every state in the Union for clerkships, money, fine clothes and trinkets; why then does he seek to make the impression that the ballot in women's hands tends to degrade her, by citing such instances to prove it. Colorado, Idaho and Wyoming will compare very favorably with such states as Montana, Nevada and others. In point of fact, he need not go away from the Pacific states to find drunkenness, gambling, prize fighting, prostitution and every form of bossism, and political corruption as rampant as in Colorado, Idaho and Wyoming.

Besides it is not true that equal suffrage has been tried in all of these states that he mentions for thirty years, as his statement clearly implies. Reduced to final analysis his loose statements and arguments prove, if they prove anything, that to vote, hold office or take an active part in politics tends to debase a woman. Now if this be true, it is because there is a debasing influence in voting and holding office and therefore every time a man or woman casts a ballot or aspires to office, he or she is made worse. If such were the facts our system of government would be a huge mistake, and we had better resolve it into an absolute monarchy, and the quicker the better. But who believes such stuff? There are good and true men and women who do not think it best for women to vote, and I do not impugn the motive of Mr. Wilson but his loose statements appear to me wholly unjustifiable and his logic ridiculous.

EUGENE WILL OBSERVE MEMORIAL DAY TOMORROW

PARADE WILL FORM ON WILLAMETTE STREET AT 9:30 O'CLOCK, AND PROCEED TO I. O. O. F. CEMETERY, WHERE SERVICES WILL BE HELD—W. R. C. WILL CONDUCT FLOWER SERVICE

Following is the program of the Memorial Day exercises to be held in Eugene tomorrow:
The marching column will form on Willamette street, right resting on Seventh street, in the following order: Companies A and C, Oregon National Guard, on right of line act as escort; Sons of Veterans, Grand Army of the Republic, Woman's Relief Corps, school children, mayor and city council and citizens in carriages.

The line will move promptly at 9:30 o'clock a. m., moving south on Willamette street to Fourteenth, east on Fourteenth street to Alder street, south on Alder street to the Odd Fellows' cemetery. The usual services will be held at the G. A. R. lot. After the services the column will move to the Spanish War Veterans' lot, where the G. A. R. will participate with those veterans in the ceremonies of honoring their dead comrades. At the conclusion of these ceremonies all will return to the city.

The Woman's Relief Corps will serve dinner at the G. A. R. hall to the old soldiers, their families and friends.
At 3 o'clock p. m. the G. A. R. column will again form and march to the mill race on East Ninth street, where they will participate with the Woman's Relief Corps in the beautiful ceremony of decorating the water-sailor dead who perished in the waters of our country and whose remains lie in unmarked and unknown graves in the depths of the rivers and oceans. At the conclusion of these ceremonies all will be dismissed, this service finishing the services of the day. No evening services will be held.

The W. R. C. Flower Service, The Woman's Relief Corps, assisted by J. W. Geary post No. 7, G. A. R., will observe the beautiful ceremony of scattering flowers on the water in memory of the soldier-sailor dead. The parade will form at G. A. R. hall at 3 o'clock and proceed to the bridge on Ninth street, where the following program will be rendered at 3:30 o'clock:

Prayer, Rev. C. C. Bell.
Singing, "Nearer, My God, to Thee," audience.
Address, Rev. P. K. Hammond.
Remarks, Commander C. H. Baker.
Ceremony of scattering the flowers on the water.
Singing, "America," audience.
"Taps."
Benediction.
A cordial invitation is extended to the general public to witness this ceremony.

HOW TO PICK AND PACK STRAWBERRIES

The Lane County Fruit and Vegetable Growers' Association has given the following directions as to the manner of picking strawberries for the market:
First grade berries, from medium to large in size.
Color—Must be good, without green tips.
Berries—Must be firm, clean, and in good condition.
No slack-filled boxes will be considered first grade.
Second grade berries must be firm and in good condition.
Do not pick wet berries.
Do not allow berries to stand in the sun after being picked.
Deliver to the warehouse as soon as possible after being picked.
