## EUGENE BOYS MAKE CANOE TRIP TO CORVALLIS

This afternoon Franklin Allen and Eugene Christian left in a canoe down the river for Corvallis, where they will see the track meet tomorrow afternoon. This trip seems to be a popular one with enthusiastic canoeists. The river between here and Albany is very rough, and has many large rapids, yet a canoeist who can handle his craft well and understands the river current is perfectly safe and feels that there is much less danger in a light canoe, which moves as he wants it, than the touch of the paddle, than a heavier boat which must necessarily go through the swift water with more force and be less easily controlled. A good canoeist never thinks any more of tipping over than a person thinks of falling off a bicycle. They say that there is a knack of balancing which must be learned.

Owners of canoes who are careful feel that accidents which happen and hurt the name of the sport are due to carelessness or inexperience. The boys say that the excitement and enthusiasm to be had by going in a canoe through a large "riffle" is such that cannot be imagined by any one who has not had the experience.

After the track meet Saturday the boys will drop down to Albany, from where they will ship their canoe back to Eugene.

## EQUAL SUFFRAGE IS ESSENTIAL TO FREEDOM AND JUSTICE

The success of the equal suffrage movement all over the world shows that women's suffrage is no longer an open question. It is a part of the ever onward movement for freedom and justice. We do not contend simply for the political emancipation of women; we are contending for progress and enlightenment. On the day the equality of American manhood-crowns woman with political equality, the race will take a long step toward the realization of the better day that shall reign in the world of tomorrow.

## GETTING A HOME EDUCATION. (East Oregonian.)

The Columbia, Mo., Herald gives the following entertaining statistics on home education. This little item should carry the University of Oregon appropriation.  
The Herald says:  
"How much does a Missouri boy cost? Fathers and guardians with boys to bring up estimate that \$5000 will rear to manhood the average Missouri boy, will send him seven months in the year for eight years to the district school, four years to high school, and four years to the university.

This amount will cover his food, clothing, books and stationery. It will even permit a margin for "tomfoolery," as one father picturesquely styles amusements.  
"The cost of the state is, on the average, \$750 for each boy. Of this amount \$180 is for the elementary school, \$180 for the high school and \$100 a year for four years at the university. The state pays \$700 and the parent pays \$2240 and the net result is one Missouri boy, educated in Missouri schools for life."

It is truly something to educate a boy at home, as the Herald says, to give him an Oregon training, an Oregon spirit, and Oregon-made citizenship.  
Home pride and patriotism should cause Oregonians to enthusiastically support the state university, in the knowledge that it will put the Oregon brand on the minds and characters of young men and women!

# The Fight on Little Round Top

Valor of the Twentieth Maine at Gettysburg.

THE war council of Federal generals the night before the second day's battle of Gettysburg became necessarily a frantic pretention of scanning the unknown. Outside on the long ridges and between the abrupt hillsides of that intricate battlefield lay the encampments of the two hostile armies, ominous and solemn. There were few campfires. At times could be heard the voice of a sentry challenging or the drawn-out clatter of a horseman on the stone pavement of the cemetery. Daybreak found curious General Meade still listening to the reports of his division commanders, to their stories of misfortune and plans for strengthening the line of battle.

The unexpected was certain to befall both offense and men, and they must be ready to perform miracles if need be. An instance of this kind was the fight of the Twentieth Maine on Little Round Top, in token of which the colonel of the regiment, Joshua L. Chamberlain, for his daring heroism received the medal of honor.

Little Round Top had escaped the glance of the Federal commanders. This was the smaller of two round hills, strewn with boulders and here, saprophytes, rising sharply from a wood of swamp, behind which stretched the Confederate battle line. At the foot of Little Round Top a body of Union troops had been posted.

It was now afternoon. Lee's attack was expected momentarily, and every man was waiting anxiously, with his eyes fixed upon the open space that separated the two armies. Just at this time, by a fortunate chance, it occurred to General Meade to order General Warren to ride over the field in the direction of the Round Tops. Warren did so, and when he came to the foot of Little Round Top he left his horse and climbed to the summit. What was his surprise to find at this point only one soldier, an officer of the signal corps. He no sooner looked about him than it became instantly clear to him that the top of this hill was in reality the key to the whole position. His astonishment gave place to consternation.

With his glass he noted the thickly wooded ridge beyond the swamp. "Captain," he said, "fire a shot into those woods."

The captain of the rifle battery did so, and a simultaneous flash of musket barrel and bayonet revealed to the northern general the presence of a long line of the enemy far outflanking the position of the Union troops. The fact thrilled him. It was most appalling. A strong force should have been entrenched long ago on this hill. Perhaps even now it was not too late. He rushed off a messenger to General Meade with a penciled word to send General Warren at least a division to hold the position at Little Round Top.

On the summit where the signal of fear was sounded the musket balls were beginning to fly. He folded up his flag and was going to leave, but at this moment Warren came back and induced him to keep the flag waving. "It may puzzle those people," he said.

## FOR GOVERNOR CHAMBERLAIN.

W. S. U'Ren has just issued an open letter to Governor Chamberlain on the senatorship and essentially on Governor Chamberlain's attitude toward Statement No. 1, of which the governor's friends are saying so much.

Some pertinent questions are asked the governor by Mr. U'Ren, questions which the governor cannot satisfactorily answer, except by admitting that he "plays to the galleries" often and that he has also disregarded the wishes of the people repeatedly, although his friends now claim he is the "only" advocate of the people's choice for United States senator.

Mr. U'Ren says in part: In the campaign of 1902, under the Mays law for the people's selection of the United States senator, Governor Geer defeated Mr. Wood by a majority of about 12,000 votes. In the legislature of 1903 Mr. Wood publicly advised every democrat member to vote always for Governor Geer, because he was the people's choice, and therefore should be unanimously elected by the legislature.

You did not add the weight of your endorsement to Mr. Wood's advice, nor did you then advocate applying the statement No. 1 principle to the election of Governor Geer as senator.

Again, when Senator Mitchell's death in 1902 caused a vacancy in the position of appointing Governor Geer, who was the people's choice by 12,000 majority, or even Mr. Wood, who was the choice of your party, you went far outside the ranks of the reformers and appointed Mr. Geer.

When you appointed Mr. Geer in 1903 you were not yet convinced that the statement No. 1 method of enforcing the Mays law for the people's direct election of U. S. Senator, was a practical thing for a politician, though you had been a mem-

ber of the league which proposed the law to the people of 1904.

In the statement No. 1 campaign of 1904 you did not make any great effort for the principle. Anti-statement No. 1 Senator Milton A. Miller is one of your warmest democratic friends and admirers and he pronounced some of the republican anti-statement No. 1 leaders that if they would help to elect him, he would never vote for Jonathan Bourne. He was elected and he did not.

Senator Miller was the nomination against a good democrat who had signed Statement No. 1. You did not lift your voice for the Statement No. 1 man. That case is a sample of your devotion to the principle of Statement No. 1 in 1904. I could give other examples.

rest. At this instant the Alabamians attacked them on front and flank, opening with a murderous fire. There were five successive charges by this force. Colonel Chamberlain with drawn sword moved up and down his lines. The bullets whizzed incessantly past him. His men were constantly groaning and falling on every side. Outnumbered more than three to one, their position was terrible, and it was apparently a hopeless one. Yet with dripping faces the men loaded and fired their muskets, displaying the cool expertness of true veterans. Colonel Chamberlain thus describes what followed:

"Seeing the desperate situation, I had ordered my men to use the cartridges of the fallen friend or foe. When they had fired their last cartridges into the faces of a rallying force I resolved to make a countercharge with the bayonet and so instructed my officers on the wheeling flank, on whom the brunt was to fall. Retiring to my center, I was about to order the movement when Lieutenant Melcher, commanding the new salient center company, came forward and begged leave to rush forward and rescue some of our wounded before the incoming enemy should trample them underfoot. I admitted his tenderness and courage and answered: 'Yes, sir; I will give you a chance. I am about to order a charge.' I went forward to our colors and shouted 'Bayonet!' adding 'Forward!' But no mortal could hear this, the roar of fire and shouts of my men drowning all words.

"We made a sickle sweep, a great right wheel with our whole line, astounding the enemy into surrender or wild retreat. We cleared the whole valley between Little Round Top and brought back 400 prisoners. I had lost half my men on the center and a third of the entire regiment on the line. The company I had sent out on our left not being at first in the charging line, it was made by secretly more than 200 men. We later advanced in midnight darkness, chambering the rough sides of Great Round Top, beyond which the remnants of Hood's division had retreated, and with the aid of two regiments held the position."

The heroic leader of this remarkable action, besides receiving the medal of honor for his work at Gettysburg, was made a brigadier general on the field in a later engagement by General Grant, and in 1895 General Chamberlain was brevetted a major general "for conspicuous gallantry in action." At the ceremony of the actual surrender of the arms and colors of Lee's army at Appomattox Chamberlain was designated to command.
