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BLIND-PIGGER JACOBS RECEIVES HEAVY SENTENCE

FIVE HUNDRED DOLLAR FINE
AND JAIL SENTENCE OF THIRTY DAYS ASSESSED AGAINST HIM BY JUDGE BRAYSON—ATTORNEY SERVES NOTICE OF APPEAL

Joe Jacobs, the West Eighth street store keeper, who was arrested last Saturday night for selling liquor at his residence, and convicted Wednesday by a jury of the offense, was sentenced by Judge Bryson, of the justice court, this afternoon to pay a fine of \$500 and to serve a 30-day term in the county jail. This is the maximum penalty. Jacobs' attorney, Fred M. DeSantis, immediately secured writs of appeal to the circuit court. After sentence was pronounced Jacobs advanced in the judge and extended his hand, thanked him. The judge gave him a light tap upon his forehead and he was thanked, but is inclined to think that Jacobs was "killing" him.

Before sentence was pronounced Judge Bryson took occasion to lecture the accused on the error of his ways and to admonish him to conform to the law. The evidence introduced at the trial brought out the fact that Jacobs had been selling the liquor at his house in the presence of his children, and that he began to break the law many years ago. His first arrest and conviction, which resulted in a fine of \$100, the judge giving him a light tap upon his forehead to quit the business.

PROPOSED JURY PLAN NOT APPROVED

Manila, May 28.—The Philippine commission has rejected the assembly bill creating the jury system. The plan provided for 25 permanent jurors in each province to serve in all jury cases, and the commission held the plan not an ideal one, as it feared the appointment of jurors would become a factor in politics.

JOINT DEBATE ON STATEMENT No. 1 AT JUNCTION PICNIC

Junction, Oregon, May 28.—Politicians were gathered at the Junction picnic yesterday by a joint debate between L. R. Edmondson, championing Statement No. 1, and W. W. Callkins and L. E. Bean, opposing the same.

Mr. Edmondson opened the debate, taking the position that the senate could never be reformed excepting by the states adopting the Primary Law and Statement No. 1. That 27 state legislatures and the house of representatives had asked for the election of United States senators by the direct vote of the people, but that the senate, composed of the representatives of the "interests" had blocked all such attempts.

Mr. Edmondson argued that Statement No. 1 was the most formidable weapon of reform the people had ever had against the "interests," and warned the audience that if candidates opposing Statement No. 1 were elected it would be heralded abroad that Oregon wanted to go back to the old methods, with all its corrupting influences and hold-up legislatures.

In conclusion Mr. Edmondson appealed to his audience to see that legislative candidates were elected next Monday who would uphold and maintain the selection of United States senators by the direct vote of the people, as provided by Statement No. 1.

BANK OF ENGLAND RATE IS REDUCED

London, May 28.—As anticipated, the rate of discount of the Bank of England was today reduced from 2 to 1 1/2 per cent. The authorities have been retaining the rate at 3 per cent owing to the absorption of gold by France and Germany, but the local monetary position had become so easy, with funds at 1 1/4 per cent, and discounts at 1 1/4 per cent below the bank rate, that the authorities had little choice but to give the trade of the country the benefit of the lower rate, as well as bringing the minimum rate nearer the market discount level.

The reduction in the discount rate was largely discounted on the Stock Exchange yesterday when consol rose 5-8, but they advanced another 1-4 this morning and the markets generally were harder, with a cheerful tendency.

PRESBYTERIANS ARE GOING TO DENVER

Kansas City, May 28.—Denver has been selected for next year's general assembly of the Presbyterian church of the United States of America. Seattle withdrew from the contest, the vote being almost unanimously in favor of the Colorado city.

CLEVELAND IS SLOWLY DYING AT LAKESIDE

Lakewood, N. J., May 28.—Renewed prosecution against allowing any information to be given out were taken today at the Lakewood hotel, where former President Grover Cleveland is suffering from a serious malady which it is believed is gradually killing him and the impression prevails that the end is near.

Utmost secrecy regarding the nature of the former president's illness has been maintained since he came here early in March. It was given out that he was indolent as the result of indigestion, but the employment of two stomach specialists who remain with him alternately 24 hours at a time has not been explained.

Yesterday it became known that Cleveland's condition had taken a turn for the worse, and last night both doctors were with him. The Cleveland apartment is the only one occupied in the great resort hotel. It is on the second floor at the end of a wing far away from the main entrance, so that the patient is completely isolated, as it were, on an island.

Mrs. Cleveland, who has continually given out optimistic reports, is not believed to be aware of the true facts of the case. It has been repeatedly reported and denied that Cleveland is suffering from cancer of the stomach, and this theory has been given support by the nature of the illness, as indicated by the actions of the physicians. Though there are several good drug stores here, all of the Cleveland prescriptions are sent to New York to be filled, apparently because the medicine might indicate the disease.

Chicago, May 29.—Bears in the grain pits of the board of Trade in the early trading today forced down prices of May deliveries of wheat, corn and oats from 2 to 2 1/2 cents a bushel.
