NEWS NOTES

Saturday's baseball scores:

Portland, 4-2; San Francisco, 3-15; Los Angeles, 2-1; Oakland, 2-2. Sunday's scores: Portland, 2; San Francisco, 1; Los Angeles, 7-1; Oakland, 1-2. Portland won five out of seven games in the series with San Francisco.

The revised report of the Chicago bureau of statistics compiled from the records of 27 leading cities shows an alarming increase in the number of suicides, particularly within the last four months. The number of those who die by their own hand has increased at the rate of almost ten per cent a year. The table is as follows: 1900, 850; 1901, 2222; 1902, 2460; 1903, 2176; 1904, 2946; 1905, 3085; 1906, 2857.

Isaac H. Smith, 58 years of age, a prominent and wealthy builder and contractor of Tillamook, committed suicide Saturday by using carbolic acid. He had been very despondent for some time. His estate is said to be of the value of \$100,000.

For the first time in the history of the Oregon Agricultural College, the senior class appeared in caps and gowns Thursday at the regular weekly assembly. The present senior class numbers over 80 and will be the largest O. A. C. has ever turned out. Commencement exercises will begin Sunday, June 14.

Denver was selected this morning as the city in which next year's General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America is to be held. But one ballot was taken for the two contesting cities. The vote was so nearly unanimous that Seattle withdrew and the Colorado capital was finally selected with one voice.

Strawberries are now being shipped out in great quantities from the Fremont-Milton country, and in a few days the time the berry picking season will be at its height. A great many have been shipped to Spokane, Seattle and different points and good prices are being received for them, all the way from \$5 to \$10 per crate, according to the size and quality.

HARTOG SPEAKS AT AD MEN'S CONVENTION

Portland, June 1.—John H. Hartog, manager of the Eugene Commercial Club, was one of the principal speakers before the Pacific Coast Ad Men's convention today. He spoke on "Promotion Work That Pays," and said in part:

The subject allotted to me, "Promotion Work That Pays," is a rather ambiguous text. All promotion work pays. If it does not pay, it is not promotion work. For to promote means to advance the interest of another ad.

The efforts to promote, the system used to promote are many however and vary widely. Those which bring results are the ones that pay and such only can be classed as promotion work, while the others come more truly under the heading of supererogatory.

Promotion work and advertising are not synonymous. They are often erroneously so considered. An ad man creates his ad and casts it out upon the world and he is done with it. His next work is to create another ad.

A promoter lays his plans for results and he is never done for as he sets his lines, each line branches off into other hands, almost unlimited in number.

For instance: A promoter after sizing up the possibilities as well as the advantages of a community, must decide how he is going to make the most of them. He knows that advertising, that is, the placing of advertisements will bring inquiries, will bring visitors, but the working of the ad, the size of the type, the quantity of the space used, while it may bring the visitor, does not hold him. The ad is a means to an end. It creates a desire and there stops. There must be a stronger magnet to hold the visitor. You must have the goods.

When a man is induced by your ad, and your correspondence to visit your community, both the ad, and the correspondence are things of the past.

Now that is just exactly where the promoter's business comes in, and where his advertising sense is of no further use to him.

Getting a community aroused to a spirit of harmony, to the appreciation of civic improvement, is the interesting task for the promoter. He may be the cleverest ad man in the world, but if he fails in the appreciation of other requirements, he will be a failure.

To get a community to look its best, so that the newcomer will fall in love with it, that's the secret. . . . To awaken a slumbering community to shame the knockers, to call forth the boosting spirits, to engage the entire public to the glorious possibilities of the right kind of promotion work, to make our world brighter and a better place to live in, to work hand in hand as friends and brethren, instead of pulling hither and thither as though man was his brother's enemy, to beautify to improve, to expand, to get results that will make a community more prosperous, more amiable, more hospitable, more happy, that's the kind of promotion work that pays.

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SAYS LOCATOR SHOWED HIM WRONG TIMBER

LOYD BELLMAN SUES WOMEN NICHOLS TO RECOVER \$1000 ON ACCOUNT OF ALLEGED FRAUDELENT LOCATION—SHOWN GOOD TIMBER AND FILED ON POOR LAND

Lloyd Bellman, who is employed in the clothing department of F. E. Dunn's store, today began suit in the circuit court against Warren Nichols to recover \$1000, which represents the amount the plaintiff is out in filing on a piece of timber land, together with interest from February, 1907.

Bellman alleges that he and Ernest R. Gilstrap, Chas. K. Komp and Gilliam T. Kitchen engaged the defendant to locate them on four quarter sections of timber land in township 19 south of range 9 and 10 west. He alleges that the defendant showed them some good timber and they duly paid him \$200 each, as a locating fee, and made their filings with the land office. Before they made their final proof, the plaintiff alleges, he discovered that the land they filed upon was not what they were shown, but land far inferior. Therefore he seeks to recover the \$800, expenses incurred in filing on the land, with interest, the total amount reaching \$1004. John M. and Geo. A. Pipes are the attorneys for the plaintiff.
