BOND PART OF COUNTY FOR SIUSLAW HARBOR WORK

CITIZENS OF LANE COUNTY COAST TIRED OF WAITING FOR GOVERNMENT TO IMPROVE BAR AND NEW PLAN BEING DISCUSSED BY PROMINENT CITIZENS

The citizens of the Siuslaw valley are tired of waiting for the government to improve the bar at the mouth of the river, so vessels can pass in or out without delay, and a plan is being discussed to raise funds for the undertaking in another way. It is proposed to bond that part of Lane county lying west of the Coast range of mountains for, say twenty or forty years, and use the money thus raised in building jetties at the mouth of the river. It is thought by the promoters that \$100,000 can be raised in this way, and with this sum considerable work can be made toward constructing the jetty. It is hoped by the time this sum is expended that the national government will be ready to take up the work and push it to completion. To meet the interest on the bonds each year it is proposed to collect a toll of perhaps 25 cents a thousand feet on the lumber and a proportionate sum on all other articles exported from this place. Later on a sinking fund can be raised in the same way to pay off the bonds when they become due. In this way the expense of building the jetty would be borne by the industries that are directly benefited by the work. Some of the leading business men of the Siuslaw are agitating the question, and most of the others have declared themselves in favor of the measure. The legal aspects have not been entirely investigated, but it is thought a bill can be passed by the legislature permitting the question to be left to a vote of the people of the district. This phase of the question will be looked into before long and we shall probably have something further to say about the matter later on.—Florence West.

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 734, passed by the common council on the 5th day of May, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 5th day of May, 1908, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city recorder in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.

That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in denominations of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will become due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city.

That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids.

That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of the act, "To re-incorporate the city of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18, 1905, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 18th day of April, 1908.

A certified check of five per cent of the amount of each bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid.

OREGON VICTOR IN TRI-STATE MEET AT SEATTLE

Seattle, Wash., May 30.—Oregon won an overwhelming victory in the tri-state intercollegiate meet here today, scoring more points than Idaho and Washington combined, and establishing a clear title to the championship of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana. The Oregon team scored 64 points out of a total of 122, while Idaho was a fair second with 35, and Washington a poor third with 23. The Oregon team had a walk-over, and won a number of the events without exerting themselves.

Edmunson, Idaho's great runner, was the star of the meet, winning the 440, 880 and mile runs, and running the fastest lap in the relay race, won by Idaho. Edmunson's work in today's meet brands him as the greatest distance runner ever seen in the Northwest. Vernon of Wash., gave the Idaho man some hard competition in the 880 and mile events, and Lowell of Oregon, ran him a hard race in the 440-yard run, but the Idaho man seemed to be invincible, and always put on a burst of speed that brought him to the tape ahead of his rivals.

Huston and Moon Win Easily

Huston and Moon of Oregon, had no trouble winning the sprints, while Kuykendall and Huston were easy winners over Montgomery of Idaho, in the hurdles. Kuykendall won the broad jump with comparative ease, and Zacharias was high man in the hammer throw. Moulton of Oregon, was another star, winning the shot-put and scoring points in both the high jump and pole-vault.

No records were broken, but the meet was interesting and was witnessed by a big crowd. By winning today's meet, Oregon established her claim to the Northwest championship for the third consecutive season.
