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CONGRESSMAN LILLEY CLAIMS CHARGES TRUE

Waterbury, Conn., June 2.—Congressman Lilley, whose resolution and charges in connection with the so-called submarine boat scandal, resulted last week in the severe scolding of Lilley by the Boutwell investigating committee, today gave out a statement on the subject in which he declared that two weeks before the report of the committee denouncing Lilley was made, Boutwell expressed an admiration for Lilley and endeavored to effect an agreement whereby the matter under investigation might be compromised.

The letter in which the allegation is made is signed by F. W. Reinsinger, M. D., and is addressed to Mrs. Lilley, after the doctor had called upon Boutwell to explain that Congressman Lilley's health necessitated his leaving the country. The letter ends by saying that when the proposition of compromise was carried to Lilley he replied he would rather die than withdraw the charges, which he knew were honest and square.

Lilley states his confidence in the justice of his charges and declares

the evidence taken by the committee shows excessive profits made by the boat company in connection with submarines.

AMOS WILKINS' BARN AT COBURG BURNED

A telephone message from Coburg soon after noon today brought the information that Amos Wilkins' barn, on his farm just below the town, was destroyed by fire this forenoon and little if any of its contents were saved. The barn was practically new and contained considerable hay and some machinery. The barn was worth \$700 or \$800, and the contents were valued at perhaps several hundred dollars.

There are no particulars as to the origin of the fire.

POSTMASTER PAGE'S SALARY INCREASED \$100

Washington, June 1.—On July 1, the salary of the postmaster at Portland will be increased from \$5000 to \$5100, because of the enormous growth in postal business in that city. Forty-six other presidential postmasters in Oregon will also be advanced

on that date, in most instances the advance being \$100 over the present salary. Among those increases are: Astoria, to \$2700; Baker City, \$2,500; Corvallis, Roseburg, Marshfield, Medford, Eugene, \$2600; Grants Pass and Hood River, \$2300; Salem, \$3000.

Postmaster Page, of Eugene, says there is an error in the above dispatch, in that Corvallis, Roseburg, Marshfield and Medford are not in Eugene's class, and that the figures for these offices are incorrect. Postmaster Page's salary was increased \$100.

TWENTY PERSONS HAVE VERY NARROW ESCAPE

New York, June 2.—Fire in a boarding house at West 30th street nearly cut off the escape of twenty boarders. One young woman jumped from the roof to the street and was killed. Several others were severely burned and otherwise injured. There were no fire escapes on the house, which prevented the rapid exit of inmates.

RETURNS INDICATE CHAMBERLAIN DEFEATS CAKE FOR SENATOR IN STATE BY ABOUT ONE THOUSAND MAJORITY

Portland, June 2.—With the exception of United States senator the entire Republican state ticket has been elected. The senatorial returns show some changes from last night's figures, but the indications are that Chamberlain (Dem.) will be the people's choice over Cake (Rep.) with a majority of about 1000 votes. Incomplete returns from ten counties outside of Multnomah give Chamberlain a majority of about 500.

According to returns now in there will be 25 State No. 1 representatives and 18 senators in the next legislature, ten of the senators being holdovers.

Statement No. 1 candidates are pledged to support in the legislature the people's choice for United States senator. There are 90 members, making 46 votes necessary for a choice.

Prohibition carried in many counties which were already "dry," and in which the questions were re-submitted. The prohibitionists gained a number of counties which had been partially "wet."

Equal suffrage has lost again. In Portland Judge O'Day is beaten for re-election, as is District Attorney John Manning (Dem.) by Police Judge Cameron (Rep.). Sheriff Stevens defeats ex-Sheriff Tom Word by 5000 majority.

LINN COUNTY DRY AND AGAINST U. OF O.

Albany, Or., June 2.—Linn county gives 1000 majority against the U. of O. appropriation. The majority for prohibition will be 550. Chamberlain leads Cake by 400.

YAMHILLERS DON'T WANT UNIVERSITY

McMinnville, Or., June 2.—The University appropriation is beaten in Yamhill by 950 majority.

MANY COUNTIES IN OREGON ARE IN DRY LIST

Portland, June 2.—Prohibition has made a surprising showing over the state, winning in almost every instance, particularly in the less populated counties. In Clackamas, where the closest fight of the series is being enacted, the drys led most of the morning, while just before noon the wets gained a lead of about 50 votes with 30 precincts of the vote to hear from. Reports from the following counties show that they have carried as a whole for prohibition. Polk, Malheur, Josephine, Douglas, Columbia, Wheeler, Yamhill, Tillamook, Columbia, Lane, Linn, Morrow, Union and Crook, with probably Lincoln and probably Clackamas. Marion county remains wet by a substantial majority.

Portland, June 2.—With complete returns in from only 62 precincts, in few of which there was a heavy vote cast, the indications are that the entire Republican ticket in Multnomah county has been victorious with the possible exception of its senatorial candidate. Returns from these precincts give Cake (Rep.) 2412 votes and Chamberlain (Dem.) 2553, making a plurality of 140 for Chamberlain. The returns are mainly from outside precincts, and the ones in which the registration was the heaviest remain to be heard from. The ones from which the complete returns are not in include the North End precincts, and in them Chamberlain is likely to receive majorities. The returns are being received slowly.

With thirty precincts complete and partial results from others, the University bill has a lead of about 1800 votes in Lane county. Outside of Eugene the precincts have not given over three or four hundred plurality so far. Coburg, Elmira, Coyote and several others went against the school.
