Latest Election Returns---U. of O. Carries---Chamberlain Elected and Statement: Controls Legislature.

By Associated Press.—Portland, June 2.—Complete returns from 51 precincts out of 114 in Multnomah county give 5826 for the University of Oregon appropriation and 2408 against. It is estimated that Multnomah will give a majority for the appropriation of 10,000 and perhaps more. Jackson, Coos, Curry and Union counties give good majorities for the appropriation and Baker county's majority is estimated at 1500. Other Portland precincts coming in show that it will carry this county by more than two to one. Returns throughout the state are somewhat slow on this bill but all reports show that it will carry by a large majority, the only counties known to oppose it being Clackamas and Marion, Lun, Washington, Yamhill and Benton.

Portland, June 2.—It is conceded that Chamberlain will carry Multnomah by 500, with substantial majority in the state. He is known to be elected. Representative First Congressional district, Willis C. Hawley, Rep.; representative Second congressional district, W. R. Ellis, Rep. Justice of the supreme court, Robt. S. Bean, Rep. Oregon Dairy and Food Commissioner—J. W. Bailey, Rep. Railroad Commissioner, First congressional district—Thos. K. Campbell, Rep.; Railroad Commissioner Second congressional district—Clyde B. Aitchison, Rep. With the exception of the United States senator the entire Republican state ticket has been elected. Returns from 26 out of the 33 counties of Oregon outside of Portland give Chamberlain a lead of 479. There are 33 Statement No. 1 representatives and 19 senators in the next legislature, according to the returns in, ten of the senators being holdovers. This gives a substantial majority. Prohibition carried in many counties which were already dry, and in which the question was re-submitted. The prohibitionists gained in a number of counties which had been partially wet but in places like Portland, Salem, The Dalles and other important centres where the question was submitted, the local option people were defeated. In Lincoln coln county, formerly dry, the wets captured several of the larger communities. The appropriation for the State University has carried, and so has the appropriation for the armories. Equal suffrage has lost again, but the recall is running well, also the amendment to the constitution to increase the number of supreme judges. The corrupt practice act to limit the amount of money spent by candidates in election has also probably carried. Inu the unofficial returns printed in tabular form today proof has been carefully read, owing to delay in getting returns as the count is still progressing.
