TOO MUCH SNOW TO WORK AT WALDO LAKE

R. Block, promoter of the proposed bridge over the falls with the waters of Waldo creek, on the summit of the Cascade mountains, returned yesterday from where he has a force of men at work repairing the trail to the lake. He says the snow is too deep yet to reach the lake, but his men are making good progress on the trail and can get within ten or twelve miles of the lake. In some places the snow is eight and ten feet deep. Mr. Block expects to return to his work in a short time and hopes that warm weather will soon come so the snow will melt in time to do a good lot of work on the reservoir project this summer.

EX-SENATOR JONES EXPIRES SUDDENLY AT WASHINGTON

Washington, June 2.—Ex-Senator James K. Jones, of Arkansas, died at his home at 5:30 o'clock last evening, after an illness of a few hours, aged 69 years. He was one of the leading Democrats of the senate from 1885 to 1902, and was one of the strongest supporters of W. J. Bryan, having as chairman of the Democratic national committee conducted the campaign of 1896 and 1900. Since leaving the senate in 1903 he had conducted a law practice in this city and has not been actively engaged in politics.

On Friday Mr. Jones returned from a visit to his daughter, Mrs. Leona Carrigan, in Arkansas, and last night was apparently enjoying good health. Complaining slightly this morning he remained in bed, and at 5:30 this afternoon died of heart failure.
