APPOINTMENTS IN FOREST RESERVE SERVICE

Washington, June 3.—The forest service has just announced the following appointments on national forests:

Arizona—Dan Jackson has been appointed a forest guard on the Black Mesa national forest and Robert A. Lape has been appointed a forest guard on the Grand Canyon (S.) national forest.

Idaho—Ralph P. Austin and William Kerby have been appointed forest guards on the Pacific national forest, and Lucius F. Shaulding has been appointed assistant forest ranger on the same national forest.

Utah—William R. Dotch has been appointed assistant forest ranger on the Scriber national forest.

Washington—Philo M. Williams has been appointed a forest guard on the Wenatchee national forest, and Hilman A. Woodworth and Porter Haver have been appointed forest guards on the Chehalis national forest.

Montana—Charles E. Ordish, Joe Crossley, Fred S. Ollie and Fred H. Chadney have been appointed forest guards on the Lewis and Clark national forests.

Colorado—Charles R. Innes has been appointed a forest guard on the Montezuma national forest.

Oregon—T. S. G. Turner has been appointed a forest guard on the Blue Mountains (N.) national forest.

New Mexico—Charles Coe has been appointed a forest guard on the Lincoln national forest.

These appointments are made to meet the increased demands of the forest service due to the opening of the grazing season, resumption of active timbering operations on forests, and permanent improvement work after the cessation of practically all business of this kind during the winter months.

BANDITS HOLD UP GT. NORTHERN TRAIN

Great Falls, May 30.—The Great Northern train from Shelby Junction, due to arrive here at 10 o'clock, was held up by masked robbers at the stockyards, about two miles west of the city, tonight. No attempt was made on the mail or express cars, but the robbers, who are said to have been mere boys, went through the passenger coaches and made all the male passengers "dig up." They succeeded in getting somewhere between \$500 and \$300, the biggest loss being by a man who was compelled to give up \$5. The night was pitch dark and the train was stopped by raising a switch, causing the engineer to stop the train. As soon as the train stopped a fusillade of shots was heard, the purpose being the scaring of the train people and passengers. One or two men jumped off the train, and one of these, William Dempsey, of Augusta, got a bullet in his leg, breaking it. He was made to get back on the train while they collected from the passengers. Ladies were told that they would not be interfered with, but every male passenger was ordered to dig up at the point of a gun.

The robbers, of whom there are said to have been seven, escaped in the darkness, and although sheriffs and police are now hunting for them, so far no trace of them has been found.

NOTICE OF SALE OF WATER BONDS

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 723, passed by the common council on the 24th day of May, 1905, and approved by the mayor on the 25th day of May, 1905, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city recorder in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city, or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.

That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in denominations of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will become due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city.

That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids.

That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of the act, "To re-incorporate the city of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18, 1905, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 18th day of April, 1905.

A certified check of five per cent of the amount of each bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid.
