**LANE COUNTY'S VOTE ON THE AMENDMENTS**

**UNIVERSITY BILL CARRIED BY OVER 1700—CHANGE OF DATE FOR STATE ELECTION, RECALL BILL AND PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION AND OTHER MEASURES WON HERE**

With complete results from thirty precincts out of fifty Lane county has a majority in favor of prohibition of over 650. The heaviest any precinct went wet was Coyote, which gave a majority of 21 to the wet column.

The University bill will carry the county by 1700 votes. A few precincts have not yet reported, but no great change is likely to be made.

Of the bills referred to the people by the legislature, two have been carried by the county and two have been lost in Lane. The measures to increase the salaries of the members of the legislature fall down here, according to present figures nearly 5 to 1. The bill to locate state institutions elsewhere than at the capital of the state—by act of legislature and by vote of the people—leads in Lane by about 500 majority.

The bill to change the time of state elections to November seems to have a lead in Lane of over 200. The bill to increase the number of supreme judges from three to five is 750 behind.

Of the referendum bills the army appropriation seems to be 1180 votes in the rear. The free transportation of state officers measure is also behind 1290 ballots. The bill to give the sheriff in each county full charge of prisoners, and that he shall work them as the county court directs, has carried heavily in Lane.

Equal suffrage is behind about 400 votes, though in one precinct it carried 2 to 1.

Both fish bills are in the lead, the one presented by the upper fish men by 200 or more, the one by the lower 500.

The famous Reddy bill is over 1,000 votes behind in Lane. The single tax is behind 1500, while the recall bill is ahead by 600.

The bill to instruct the members of the legislature to vote for the people's choice for United States sena-

tor has carried the county by 700, according to present figures.

The proportional representation bill is ahead in the county by 300.

The measure to limit the money used in a campaign passed, apparently 2 to 1.

The law to limit the issuance of indictments to grand juries is 300 votes ahead in this county.

The bill to divide Wasco county also leads in the "yes" column by several hundred.

**SAYS WIFE HAS VERY BAD TEMPER**

Arthur W. Summers yesterday began suit in the circuit court against his wife, Frances M., for divorce and for the custody of their minor child, Clifford. In his complaint Summers alleges that he and his wife were married at Junction City on January 14, 1905. He claims that his wife has an ungovernable temper and is continually interfering with his business, thus holding him up to the ridicule of persons with whom he does business and with his family and friends. He alleges that she has threatened to kill him. Williams & Bean are the attorneys for the plaintiff.
