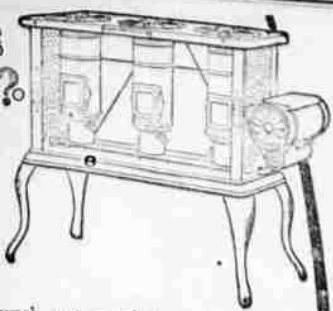

DYNAMITE CAN FOUND IN GLENDALE OPERA HOUSE

Glen Dale, Or., June 3.—A most decidedly unusual and wholesale murder was revealed here today when H. G. Sonnenman, merchant and owner of the opera house, found an internal machine at his new auditorium.

The internal machine was placed in the vestibule of the opera house on the night of March 7, when the "Blue and the Gray" was in progress. The play had been well advertised, and the whole town turned out to see it, standing room being at a premium.

When the play was over, Mr. Sonnenman, upon opening the door for the crowd to file out, noticed a gunny sack containing a can about the size of a five-gallon oil can, and supposing that it was a can of oil that some one had forgotten, he placed it to one side.

About forty feet of the tube had burned and the interior of the can and part of the contents had been thoroughly blackened. If the charge had been exploded as intended there is little hope that anybody in the opera house would have escaped death or serious injury.

No clue to the perpetrators of the vicious attempt has so far been discovered, but a subscription list is being passed throughout the district and everybody is subscribing freely to offer a liberal reward for his capture and conviction.

PORTLAND MARKET REPORT.

Portland, Or., June 1.—The local wheat market continues firm at 60c for quality that has raised for some time, no change being announced at the Board of Trade today. Chicago reported a slight advance on both the 1st and 2nd of June, but the local market was unchanged.

Vegetables and Fruits Active.
Trade was active in fruits and vegetables generally today, with supplies in some lines short of regular amounts. The small off-sets of blackberries, raspberries and apricots in the market moved readily, at the prices that prevailed yesterday and were only a little less active than yesterday.

Best Poultry Trade Reported.
The quality marked yesterday and today was a fine affair, but dealers are inclined to look for improvement before the end of the week, through increased demand on account of the festival. Local quotations were not changed today.

Berries Scarce and Firm.
The strawberry supply was light again today, receipts from all quarters being far short of the demand. Locally, but more than the market at large, the berries were picked at about the same time they were picked in other parts of the state. New California berries were quoted at \$1.00 to \$2.00, and Oregon at \$2 to \$4 a case. There was a strong demand for local berries at the low price, but the market was looked for before the end of the week.

Veal Market Is Stronger.
As a result of a continued war between the supply and the demand, veal is a scarce commodity and the demand was strong. However, for the week there has been a slight increase in the supply, and the market is stronger.

Salmon Supply Inadequate.

Flash dealers report the supply of salmon steadily growing smaller as the end of the fishing season on the Willamette draws near. Daily offerings are now short of the requirements of the trade. The season on the Willamette ends June 15. After that date the trade will have to depend on the Columbia, and the catch there is reported materially under the normal. There were no changes in fish quotations today. Halibut and other sorts continue in fair supply.

Hop Men are All Bearish.

In the hop market the local trade is generally bearish. The small sport of export buying noted a short time ago seems to have disappeared altogether. The New York Producers' Price Current gives the following state of the market there:

"Locally the market continues very firm, with stock in small compass and holders unwilling to accept prices offered. In the face of these conditions business has been limited to one or two small scales of importation. In New York State the weakness of last week continues, and in the absence of buying orders growers would have to make concessions in price to dispose of their goods. Crop reports from all sections of the state are very good, as the weather has been excellent the past couple of weeks. The vine is making rapid headway, and from the present outlook the yield in this state should exceed last year's crop.

Local Wool Market Is Steady.

At this time the local wool market is showing a steady tone, but prices are in no way responding to the new condition. There is, however, a disposition among the buyers to do business just now, while a short time ago they sorely cursed whether or not they accepted their bid or not. Some disposition continues the list of the Willamette Valley wool raisers because of the uniformly low prices they are receiving. Nevertheless, when compared with the average prices received for other clips from various sections of the list of the Willamette Valley man is not so hard after all.

Shantlo will hold its first sale today, while the first sale in Idaho will be held at Mountain Home tomorrow. The following are the sales dates for the remainder of the season in Eastern Oregon:

Atimont, postponed sale, date not fixed; Pendleton, June 8; Pilot Rock, June 9; Honey, June 11; Vale, June 12; Burns, June 13; Baker City, June 14 and July 11; Elgin, June 25 and July 9; Condon, July 15; Shantlo, June 22 and July 6.

The dates for the various wool sales in Idaho have been arranged as follows:

Mountain Home, June 3; Payette, June 6; Malheur, June 8; Caldwell, June 12; Boise, June 11; Shoshone, June 13; Tular, June 15; Halley, June 15; Harlow, June 16; Bellevue, June 16; Bliss, June 17.

Portland Livestock Market.

There was no important change in the condition of the market, and yesterday's quotations in all lines prevailed. The demand for cattle continues strong, and this is true also of sheep and hogs, especially the best grades of stock. For lambs and calves the demand is moderate.
