

MANY TRAINS ARE LOST IN MONTANA

Butte, June 6.—With crop losses estimated from two-thirds to total destruction in several rich valleys of the state, with damage to railway lines estimated at more than \$1,000,000, and while systems cannot scarcely be put on a normal basis under two weeks, with from eight to ten passenger trains stalled in Montana with little hope of rescue, Montana today is experiencing the worst flood in the history of the Northwest. It is impossible to get trains out of Butte over any railway. Great Northern trains are tied up near Basin. Northern Pacific officials frankly confess that they do not know where their express trains are nor can the whereabouts of the Oregon Short Line train be learned this morning.

CHAMBERLAIN HAS ENOUGH FOR ELECTION

FORTY-SEVEN MEN CERTAIN FOR HIM—FIVE MORE PROVE NON-COMMITTAL—32 REPUBLICANS PROMISE—SEVEN DEMOCRATIC SENATORS AND EIGHT DEMOCRATIC REPRESENTATIVES MAKE MORE THAN THE 46 REQUIRED TO WIN.

Portland, June 6.—Thirty-two of the Oregon legislature have announced that they will vote for Governor Chamberlain, the Democratic nominee and the people's choice for United States senator. Adding to these pledged Republicans the further strength of seven Democratic senators declaring that they will vote for Chamberlain has a total following on joint ballot of 47 votes, or one more than the 46 required for an election. The

other five supposedly Statement No. 1 Republicans—Senators A. A. Bailey, of Clackamas and Multnomah, and W. T. Schofield, of Clatsop and Representatives—Fred J. Brady and L. D. Mahone, of Multnomah, and Allen Eaton, of Lane—declines to commit themselves.

In the senate every one of the seven Statement No. 1 Republican senators-elect has made statements declaring that he will vote for Chamberlain. These senators are H. R. Albee, Dan Kellaker, C. W. Nottingham and Ben Selling, of Multnomah; Albert Abraham, of Douglas; N. J. Sinnott, of The Dalles, and W. N. Barrett, of Washington-Yamhill-Tillamook-Lincoln. To these should be added Senators L. H. Ringham, of Lane; T. B. Kay, of Marion, and A. J. Johnson, of Benton, hold-overs, who were elected two years ago as Statement No. 1 members of the senate. Of the other 12 hold-overs five are unpledged and anti-statement, five are Democrats and two refused to declare their position. The unpledged Republican hold-overs are: J. N. Smith, of Marion; F. J. Miller, of Linn-Marion; S. C. Beach, of Multnomah; W. G. Cole, of Umatilla, and J. N. Hart, of Baker. The Democratic hold-overs are: M. A. Miller, of Linn; L. D. Mullit, of Jackson; F. H. Caldwell, of Yamhill; J. E. Hedges, of Clackamas, and C. J. Smith, of Umatilla. Senators A. A. Bailey and W. T. Schofield, Statement No. 1 hold-overs, will not commit themselves on the senatorial

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FATAL EXPLOSION ON THE CRUISER TENNESSEE

San Pedro, Cal., June 6.—One more death was added to the list of those who lost their lives in yesterday's explosion on the cruiser Tennessee, making a total of five. The last one was E. J. Burns, a coal passer, of New York city, who succumbed after a night of terrible suffering. Early today six of the seriously hurt were brought off the Tennessee and sent to Los Angeles by a special electric car. Those removed were: Walter S. Burns, coal passer, New York; R. W. Watson, fireman, second class, East St. Louis, Ill.; A. Hayes, water tender, Brooklyn, N. Y.; H. Fitzpatrick, fireman, first class, Norfolk, Va.; F. S. Maxfield, fireman, second class, Toughona, Pa. Maxfield is not expected to survive. Several others probably died from inhaling steam and gas. The bodies of E. J. Burns, New York; E. C. Boggs, Woodland, Ala.; G. W. Meek, Skidmore, Kas.; George Wood, Scranton, Pa.; A. Reinhold, Germany, were brought ashore this afternoon and interred with honors in the Harbor View cemetery, overlooking the bay.

Reinhold and Meek were struck dead at their posts. Boggs and Wood crawled or were dragged into the adjoining fire room, No. 11, and died almost immediately. The surviving seamen, all of whom received some injuries, acted with the greatest heroism, aiding their unfortunate mates.

San Pedro, Cal., June 5.—While the United States armored cruiser Tennessee was steaming nineteen knots an hour on speed trial off Point Hueme, Cal., at 11:08 this morning, a steam pipe burst in the starboard engine room under a 235-pound pressure, killing four men and injuring four others—all of the men

in the compartment at the time. Two of the injured will die. The explosion, the cause of which is unknown, occurred only a few minutes after Admiral Uriel Sebree, Captain J. B. Howard and Chief Engineer Robertson had left the engine room on a tour of inspection. Four of the men were killed instantly and two more are expected to die at any moment. There were fourteen men in the fire room when the plug, which is four inches in diameter and enclosed with water inside the boiler, blew out, driving a current of scalding steam, coal dust, cinders and hot ashes out through the ash-pit, and showering the half-naked men. A blast from the steam ventilators told those on deck of the accident. Lieutenant-Commander Robertson, the navigator, instantly sounded a general alarm and stopped 29 lines of hose ready for instant use in case of fire. Within the hoarse fire room, No. 3, amidships, on the starboard side, which is one of the enclosed fire compartments, the seamen were fighting for life.

TRY TO HIRE STATEMENT NO. 1 LEGISLATORS OFF

Portland, June 6.—The Evening Telegram today says that an agent of the opposition to Statement No. 1 has approached at least three members of the house elected from Multnomah county with a view to having them secede and vote for a Republican United States senator in opposition to Governor George E. Chamberlain, who was elected by the people at last Monday's election to go to Washington. The legislature is overwhelmingly Republican and fifty-two members are sworn to support the candidate receiving the popular vote at the regular election. This would result in the Republican legislature sending Chamberlain, Democratic, to the Senate. The Telegram does not name the legislators who have been "seen," but says a young lawyer is acting for the interests opposed to Chamberlain.

GAS TANK EXPLODES INJURING MANY

Indianapolis, June 6.—The plant of the Prest-O Light Company on South street, which stores gas tanks, blew up this morning. Eleven were injured, one fatally. St. Vincent's hospital and a fire engine house adjoining were badly damaged. Of the injured three were employees of the wrecked plant, two city firemen, four hospital employees, one patient in the hospital and one sister of the hospital staff.

BATTLE BETWEEN ROBBERS AND A POSSE OF CITIZENS

Pittsburg, June 6.—While attempting to arrest four men early this morning near the Elizabeth county line, Detective Kurlart shot and killed one of the men and was himself wounded twice. The men are alleged to be implicated in the robbery of the Monongahela Consolidated Coal & Coke Company's store on Thursday morning. The other three men are barricaded in a vacant house and are holding a posse at bay with rifles and revolvers. An automobile with six county detectives has gone to the scene. A desperate battle is expected. The men are surrounded in the cabin of a wood chopper named John Patterson, he was arrested early today by Kurlart, who returned to the cabin and surprised the four men. His command to surrender met with a refusal.

COUNT FOR LANE COUNTY IS FINISHED

NO GREAT CHANGES FROM UNOFFICIAL REPORTS ALREADY PUBLISHED

CAKE'S PLURALITY IN LANE COUNTY IS 669—DOWN BEATS GRIFFIN FOR SHERIFF BY 885 VOTES—LOCAL OPTION CARRIES 770 STRONG

The official count, which was finished today, of the ballots cast in Lane county at the election last Monday, shows that Cake has a plurality over Chamberlain of 669 votes; Down, Democratic nominee for sheriff, beat Griffin by 885 votes, and Lee won over Stewart by 1510 votes. Representative Eaton led the legislative ticket with a vote of 3887. Calkins beat Edmanson by 753 votes.
