THIRTY-TWO BIRTHS SEVENTEEN DEATHS DURING MAY

During the month of May in Lane county there were 32 births and 17 deaths, according to County Health Officer J. W. Harris' report. There were also five cases of smallpox in the county and five of diphtheria.

Three died from pneumonia. Of those that died 12 were males and 5 females. Of the births 13 were males and 14 females.

The causes of death were as follows:
Pneumonia, 3; tuberculosis, 1; Bright's disease, 2; apoplexy, 1; cerebral meningitis, 1; ptomaine poisoning, 1; whooping cough, 1; gangrene of the lungs, 1; puerperal fever, 1; chronic cystitis, 1; kangrene of leg, 1; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 1; obstruction of bile duct, 1.

In the house 22 of the 25 Republican Statement No. 1 representatives have said they will abide by the statement and vote for Chamberlain for senator. They are: O. L. Hatlenburg, H. D. Patton and A. C. Libby, of Marion; George Jones, of Douglas; B. F. Jones, of Polk-Linn; J. P. Rusk, of Union-Wallowa; W. J. Mariner, of Gilliam-Sherman-Wheeler, and H. C. Dadds, of Wasco, Representatives-elect Fred J. Brady and T. D. Mahone, of Multnomah, and Allen Eaton, the latter being re-elected as a Statement No. 1 man from Lane, refused positively to define their position and are classified as non-committal. The Oregonian was unable to locate A. W. Orton, of Multnomah, and N. J. Sinner, of Wasco, but both of these men announced in yesterday's Telegram their intention to abide by the Statement No. 1 pledge, and as a result have been listed as Chamberlain supporters.

ity being greater on posterior surface. It is three-eighths of an inch long and three-sixteenths of an inch thick. It is highly transparent, rather soft and very elastic. The lens is enclosed in a capsule that is thin, transparent, brittle and elastic. It is made up of one layer upon another of tissue that is so fine that it distinguishes the separate layers a very powerful microscope is required. The layers being placed one on another, make the lens resemble an onion. The layers at the center form a hardened nucleus but grow softer toward the outside. As people grow older the outer layers become more hard and less elastic, constituting Presbyopia, which will be mentioned later.

On either side of the lens, as shown in the above drawing, is a tiny muscle which is attached to it, called the ciliary muscle.

After the age of forty-three or forty-five is reached, the crystalline lens

becomes so hard that when the ciliary muscle relaxes, it does not respond by becoming more convex. Then the letters and stitches seem to run together and blur, and we find that to see clearly the work must be held farther from the eyes than is convenient. This is the time of all others when the aid of the Refractive Optician is required, to prescribe proper glasses, and should not be neglected as neglect brings eye-strain and headaches.

In the above illustration posterior

to the crystalline lens is a large space called the Vitreous chamber which is filled with a jelly-like substance called the vitreous humor. This forms four-fifths of the body of the eye. The vitreous humor has no special part to perform in the act of seeing, but is the support of the eye. In front it forms a hollow in which the crystalline lens rests and in back it is convex, filling out the curve of the retina and holding it in place.
