

## BRITISH LION AND RUSSIAN BEAR EMBRACE

Revel, June 9.—The meeting of King Edward and Emperor Nicholas took place today with all due formality, being the first time an English monarch has ever visited Russian waters officially. The day was favored by brilliant summer weather.

The British squadron, escorting the royal yacht Victoria and Albert, with King Edward on board, entered the Bay of Revel shortly after 10 o'clock. There were the customary salutes and after an exchange of formal visits the King and emperor lunched on board the Russian yacht Polar Star as guests of the Dowager empress.

Thousands of spectators gathered to witness the meeting of the rulers.

### CHESTER THOMPSON FREED FROM ASYLUM

Tacoma, Wash., June 8.—Chester Thompson walked out of the county jail, a free man, at 5:30 o'clock this afternoon, on an order issued by Judge Spell, of the superior court, 15 minutes before. For a moment, as he

went out into the open air, he hesitated, blinded by the sunshine, and bewildered.

"It seems so strange," he explained to his father and brother, who accompanied him.

Imperial, Cal., June 9.—Trouble has arisen between the white and Japanese melon pickers and the county officials are making a great effort to restore order. Yesterday at 11 o'clock a number of young men overran a wagon loaded with Japanese melons and the team ran away. Attracted by a number of Japanese melons from a wagon and thrown out, but no harm was done.

The trouble always due to a surplus of melon pickers, five thousand and having arrived in the past month and they are still coming at the rate of two hundred per day. Considerable privation has existed, but it is believed the rapidly ripening crop will provide work for all.

Washington, June 9.—It has been determined by the friends of Governor Guild, of Massachusetts, that his name shall be presented at the Chicago convention as a candidate for vice president. Senator Lodge, who is to be permanent chairman of the convention, will leave the chair during the proceedings to present to the convention the candidate of Guild. His nomination will be seconded by Charles S. Osborne, of South Ste. Marie.

Chicago, June 9.—The national committee has decided to recognize both delegations from Louisiana, giving each half a vote.

Washington, June 9.—Indications are multiplying that Cortelyou will be advanced by President Roosevelt and Secretary Taft as their candidate for vice president.

Cortelyou himself naturally declines to discuss the matter of his candidacy for the very sufficient reason that his native state has already

in the field a candidate for the presidency in the person of Governor Hughes. The Associated Press journal, however, that it can now be stated as a fact that in the opinion of his friends the time has come when Cortelyou should be placed in a position to be recognized as New York's candidate for the vice presidency in the event of the election of Governor Hughes from the middle-Atlantic zone, and they are prepared to move in force upon the convention delegates at Chicago.

One reason for the confidence of Cortelyou's friends is asserted to be their belief that by strenuous opposition offered by the Fairbanks contingent to the recognition of Southern Tati delegates in the battle before the national committee now in progress, the coupling of the names of Taft and Fairbanks or Roosevelt and Fairbanks on one ticket has become impossible.

## INDICTMENTS RETURNED AGAINST ELEVEN MEN

Portland, Or., June 9.—Seven indictments, charging 11 prominent Eastern Oregon citizens with conspiring to defraud the government out of nearly 30,000 acres of unpatented Indian lands in Umatilla county were returned by the federal grand jury in the United States court yesterday.

Prominent among the accused, most of whom reside at Pendleton, are: J. H. Raley, Democratic politician and lawyer; William Slusher, local representative from Morrow and Umatilla counties in the 1907 legislature; Almon Knotts, John W. Crow, John A. Ryan, William Caldwell and C. W. Matthews, wealthy ranchers and sheepmen; and John Vert, formerly of the First National Bank of Pendleton. The other less prominent defendants are: Bailey Ross and Samuel Ormstead, wood dealers; and William Rabe, a horse trader. These are alleged to have served as active field lieutenants for the others. Mr. Raley is named as defendant in six of the seven indictments, while Mr. Slusher and Mr. Rabe are confronted with two counts.

### Specific Charge of Insubordination

The specific charge against the several defendants is that they solicited and procured presents to make false and fraudulent applications and affidavits for the purchase of the Umatilla lands and for a consideration induced the applicants at the time they applied for the lands, or prior thereto, to make contracts whereby it is agreed that the lands so purchased should inure to the benefit of the defendants named in the indictments.

Further indictments in connection with these alleged frauds may be expected, as the grand jury, after making its report, resided to its quarters and, with United States Attorney McCull, resumed the examination of some 25 additional witnesses that are in the city to give testimony relating to the same questionable transactions.

All the indictments allege the violation of section 5414, the general conspiracy statute, and, with the exception of dates and names of the principals and the entries, are similar as to text.
