UNIVERSITY'S MAJORITY NOW OVER 3500
Complete official returns from all counties but Harney and Wheeler show that the University of Oregon appropriation bill has passed by a majority of 3569. The returns from the above counties will not change the result materially, for their vote is light and will probably break about even on the University question. Multnomah county has given the bill a majority of 9480 instead of 8399, as first announced.
The total affirmative vote on the measure, with the exception of the vote of Harney and Wheeler counties, is 43,233, against a total negative vote of 40,149. In this city the bill has carried at the rate of 3 to 1, and in such cities as Astoria, The Dalles, Padgett, LaGrande, Baker City, Roseburg, Marshfield and Ashland, the vote has been about two to one in favor of the measure. In many of the country districts of the Willamette valley the vote has been overwhelmingly against the University. The country districts of this county and of Eastern Oregon have given more favorable returns for the University, especially in the communities where the alumni and students of the University reside.—Oregonian.

ROYAL ARCH MASONS ELECT GRAND OFFICERS
Portland, June 9.—Officers were elected by the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Oregon yesterday to serve for the ensuing year. Installation of the new officials occurred yesterday afternoon, and the sessions of the grand chapter closed last night.
Numbers of out-of-town Masons are in the city in attendance at the various Masonic gatherings scheduled for this week. In addition to the work of conferring degrees there will be special lodge meetings of the various local organizations.

HERMAN BILLEK MUST BE HANGED
Springfield, Ill., June 8.—The governor and the pardon board today refused to commute the sentence of death passed upon Herman Billek, who was convicted of having murdered the entire Vazal family in Chicago.
Billek was convicted after a hard-fought legal battle, which lasted two weeks. The poisoning of the Vazal family was a mystery for months before the crime was fastened upon Billek. The murderer will be hanged Friday.

FIGHT AGAINST PROHIBITION AT MEDFORD
Action was begun today to prevent prohibition from going into effect in Medford, as provided under the city charter, says the Medford Tribune.
A temporary injunction was applied for from Circuit Judge Hanna by Attorney Robert G. Smith, representing J. C. Hall, to restrain the county court from declaring prohibition in effect in Medford, as provided under the local option law. It is expected that prohibitionists will seek to dismiss the injunction, which the wet forces will seek to have made permanent. Attorney McAllister, of the Anti-Saloon League, is in the city, presumably to defend the league's cause.
The charter's clause, under which the action is brought, reads as follows:
"The city council shall have power and authority within the city of Medford to license, tax, regulate or prohibit barrooms, drinking shops, billiard rooms, bowling alleys, dance halls, and all places where spirituous, malt or vinous liquors are sold or kept for sale, irrespective of any general law of the state on this subject, enacted by the legislature or by the people at large."
The county court is compelled by the local option law to declare the result of prohibition 11 days after the election. The case will be fought at every point by the wet town advocates.
Attorney Smith said today: "This is not a question of sentiment, but of law, which, I think, is altogether in favor of the charter, which was passed after the local option law. The only supreme court decision upon the point is that of the case of Renshaw vs. the county court of Lane county, where it was held that if the city charter had been specific on the questions involved, it would have been binding. Medford's charter is specific."

NOTICE OF SALE OF WATER BONDS
Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 734, passed by the common council on the 5th day of May, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 5th day of May, 1908, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city recorder in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city, or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.
That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in denominations of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will become due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city.
That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids.
That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of the act, "To re-incorporate the city of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18, 1905, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 15th day of April, 1908.
A certified check of five per cent of the amount of each bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid.
