Eugene business men want the people of Portland to take a trip to the former city and inspect the big improvements made in the last year, says the Portland Journal. A committee of Eugene business men will within a few days come to Portland to make preliminary arrangements for such an excursion.

"We have been doing some good work at Eugene in the last year," said S. H. Friendly at the Portland Commercial Club today, "and we want Portland to make us a visit. Eugene is no longer an unimproved country town, but a thriving, good-looking city, prosperous and happy with what it already possesses, and the many greater and better things it is still to secure."

"We propose that a special train shall be run from Portland to Eugene on Wednesday, June 24, on a schedule that will permit the Portland delegation to spend the day with us. The train should leave Portland about 7 a. m., and returning reach Portland about 8 or 9 o'clock in the evening. These details can, however, be arranged to suit all. We want a big delegation of Portland men to come to Eugene some day this month and be the guests of the city of Eugene."
