Five Pacific coast athletes were chosen for the regulars and one for the supplementary list. Andre Glarner of the Olympic club, world's champion in the 900-yard run, is not among the list of regulars or extra men.

Those from the coast who are to go are: Forrest C. Smithson of the Whitmanah club of Portland, Oregon, in the high hurdles; A. C. Gilbert of Yale, a Portland, Oregon, athlete, in the pole vault; Dan J. Kelly of the Irish-American Athletic club, a Baker City and Oregon University boy, in the sprints and broad jump; Ralph Rose, weight man of the Olympic club of San Francisco, and S. H. Bellah of Stanford University, in the pole vault. C. F. Miller of Stanford in the 440-yard dash, is the coast man in the supplementary list.
