The interior of the new passenger depot is being plastered.
The residence at 845 Onyx avenue has been quarantined on account of the existence of a case of smallpox there.
Among the carload shipments into Eugene this morning was a car of flour for the Hubble Transfer Company.
The district schoolhouse at Alma, in the southwestern part of the county, was destroyed by fire a few days ago, according to word received by County School Superintendent Dillard.
Eighth grade examinations will be held again tomorrow by County School Superintendent Dillard and in several of the districts throughout the county.
Marriage licenses were issued today to the following: John H. Harper, aged 22, of Portland, and Miss Alma Deffenbacher, 18, of Coburg; Benjamin Stewart Bingham, 22, and Miss Ida Romella Hendershott, 18, both of Eugene.
Stuart Jackson, formerly connected with Julia's Golden's cigar store, has purchased a half interest in Ben Bingham's billiard parlors in the Rankin block on West Seventh street, buying out Dick Richardson, Mr. Jackson understands the business thoroughly and he and Ben will make a good team.
Free Thomas, the Eugene architect, has been engaged to draw plans for a two-story reinforced concrete business block to be built at Grants Pass by Arthur Conklin, editor and proprietor of the Pacific Outlook. There will be two store rooms on the lower floor of the building and 14 rooms on the second floor.
