The morning paper is soliciting subjects for cartooning, who are willing to pay \$20 a throw for the sake of seeing themselves made uglier than they really are--and goodness knows, most men are ugly enough without being cartooned.

Only one thing about the scheme The Guard objects to and that is the announcement of the morning paper that it proposes to print these cartoons merely as a work of art, and in receiving no compensation for it.

The original cartoon is made approximately 14x24 inches and can be framed after the cut is made.

The participant pays for the service and you must choose men of standing and ample means who are ready and willing to pay for dignified and high grade publicity.

The minimum charge of each cartoon is \$17, of which I get 33-1/3 per cent. I furnish cuts, cartoons and all the soliciting. You furnish space and write the letters, copy of which will be sent you should you accept the proposition.

As nearly as we can recall The Guard replied to Artist Palmer's proposition that it was ready to go into any legitimate business proposition connected with newspaper publishing; that if our patrons wanted to be cartooned at \$17 a head we would assist them to realize that ambition, but we doubted very much if a very extensive business could be worked up, probably not enough to justify such an eminent artist in seeking it.

Well, what do you think, they've caught old Blank for a twenty spot! Funny how some of these old tight-wads who wouldn't give up a dollar for anything else are daffy on the subject of getting their picture in the paper.

And other persons, not quite so outspoken, would think things in a similar vein.

But to return to Mr. Palmer's proposition. It will be seen that the morning paper is receiving 66-2/3 per cent of the gross proceeds of the hold-up, and furthermore that it is charging \$20, instead of Mr. Palmer's \$17 quotation.

UNOFFICIAL RETURNS OF STATE ELECTION

Following are the unofficial returns of six of the most important measures submitted to the people at the recent Oregon election: Armory bill, appropriating \$100,000 for new armories for National Guard, yes, 25,831; no, 46,885. Majority against, 15,054. Woman suffrage, for, 25,570; against, 42,975. Majority against, 17,215. First fish bill, prohibiting gill-net fishing for salmon on the lower Columbia river, for, 35,181; against, 30,389. Majority for, 4792. Reddy bill, allowing incorporation of cities to regulate the sale of intoxicating liquors, regardless of the provisions of the state local option law, yes, 28,240; no, 37,232. Majority against, 8993. Single tax bill, for, 24,209; against, 46,258. Majority against, 22,049. Second fish bill, prohibiting trawl and fish wheels in the upper Columbia river, for, 31,194; against, 23,691. Majority for, 17,503. The University appropriation bill of \$125,000 a year carried by about 3500 majority in the state.

OREGON NIGGARDLINESS.

The majority of 2500 votes already accounted for, in behalf of the University of Oregon appropriation of \$125,000; and the majority of 19,500 against the appropriation of \$100,000 for the building of O. N. G. armories, convicts the State of Oregon of niggardliness, pure and simple.

Such returns, in such cases, make manifest the spirit of dubious economy of the unprincipled estimate of its plainer duties.
