### CHAUTAUQUA ASSEMBLY AT GLADSTONE

The Willamette Valley Chautauqua Association holds its Assembly at Gladstone, Ore., between Portland and Oregon City, July 7th to July 19th, inclusive. Twenty-six programs will be given, besides three splendid concerts and a summer school of twelve expert instructors. To give Gospel measure, athletics have been boomed and special boys' and girls' clubs, led by excellent trainers, and a fine ball tournament will be given each day. To help mothers, a kindergarten has been established, so the babies can be left in care of reliable persons while the mother enjoys the programs.

There will be many star lecturers. Hon. John Sharp Williams, the great leader of Democracy in the House of Representatives, will deliver his "America for Americans" on July 10. Dr. Ira Lovelle, who captivated the people so greatly last year, will come July 9, 11 and 12. Robert McIntyre, now a Bishop of the M. E. Church, will give "The Battle of Life" July 17. "The Evolution of Abraham Lincoln" July, and a magnificent sermon on July 19.

Edwin Southern, better known as "Cyclone" Southern, the inimitable "Florida Cracker" will inform the people what he would do in "If I Were the Devil" on July 14. The day after he will give another "Devil" lecture, though he himself is not so devilish as one might think. We are told however, he will appear in full costume of His Satanic Majesty. He is great.

One of the most captivating entertainments will be the work of Dr. Alfred Montgomery, the great farrier painter. He brings with him \$90,000 worth of paintings, one alone being valued at over \$20,000. On July 7, he presents "American Art" July 9, "Dilettism in Art" and July 10, a fine popular "Chalk Talk." Bishop McIntyre calls him the "Riley of the Brush." Among the many other great workers is Mrs. Leonora M. Lake, the very able and enthusiastic temperance lecturer from the Catholic church. On July 7, she gives, "My Neighbor and I" on July 8, W. C. T. U. day, "The Divine Rights of the Child." The W. C. T. U. of all the state are rallying for the lecture of the 9th.

Special classes in English and American Literature, Sacred Literature, Science, Art, and every plane of Chautauqua work are well established, and everything is prepared for an ideal summer outing.

### GUARDSMEN MAY HAVE TWO WEEKS' ENCAMPMENT

If the recommendations of the adjutant generals of Oregon and Washington are carried out, Eugene guardsmen will have two full weeks at American Lake this summer instead of 10 days' encampment that has been ordered.

There is sufficient money this year for a two week's encampment and believing that the additional four days will be highly beneficial to the men the head officers of the guards have asked that the time be extended. Whether or not the request will be granted remains to be seen.

At present the orders are for the encampment to commence August 3 and for the camp to be broken August 12. Under this arrangement the Eugene companies will leave this city on Saturday, August 1, and join the Third regiment in Portland the following day. From that city it is probable that the Third and Fourth regiments and Battery A will leave for American Lake on three special trains.

### NOTICE OF SALE OF WATER BONDS

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 734, passed by the common council on the 5th day of May, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 5th day of May, 1908, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city recorder in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city, or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.

That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in denominations of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will be come due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city.

That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids.

That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of the act, "To re-incorporate the city of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18, 1905, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 18th day of April, 1908.

A certified check of five per cent of the amount of each bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid.
