CRIMINAL CASES ARE UP IN THE CIRCUIT COURT

DEMURRER IN CASES OF HARVEY JONES, FRED CRAIG AND WILLIAM TWILLEY TAKEN UNDER ADVISEMENT—PARMENTER REFUSES TO PLEAD AND COURT ENTERS PLEA OF NOT GUILTY

In the circuit court this forenoon David Parmenter, who is accused of polygamy, refused to enter a plea and the court entered a plea of not guilty for him. The time of his trial has not yet been set. Parmenter is the man who forfeited his bail last November and went to Nebraska, Deputy Sheriff Hammond bringing him back about a month ago.

Harvey Jones, Fred Craig and William Twilley, accused of contributing to the delinquency of Addie Watts, a minor, were to have entered pleas today, but their attorneys filed demurrers, which are now under advisement by the judge.

In the case of the state vs. G. M. Whitson, accused of the forgery of several checks and passing them on the Hotel Smeede and Chambers Hardware Company, a demurrer was sustained and the case re-submitted to the district attorney.

W. B. Fenton, attorney for the Southern Pacific Company, and Roger B. Sinnott and A. S. Bennett, attorneys for M. J. Doyle, who at the last term of court was awarded \$45,000 damages for the loss of both of his legs by being run over by a train at Divide, argued for and against a new trial this morning. The motion was taken under advisement.

COBURG MAN SENT TO INSANE ASYLUM

John McKittrick, of Coburg, was examined as to his sanity this afternoon and committed to the asylum at Salem. He is aged 76 years and can neither read nor write. He imagines that visions come to him and forecast coming events. This morning at Coburg he imagined that he was told where a lot of money was hidden under a barn and had a number of citizens there worked up over the matter until they discovered that his mind was affected. Drs. Wall and Proutice were the examining physicians.

OLIVER HUSTON IS CHOSEN TRACK CAPTAIN

Oliver Huston, the crack sprinter, was today elected captain of the University of Oregon track team for 1908. He will be a junior next year and his home is in Portland. Huston ran the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds flat several times during the past season, and is fast in the hurdles and the 220-yard dash. Under Bill Hayward's training he promises to develop into another Dan Kelly.

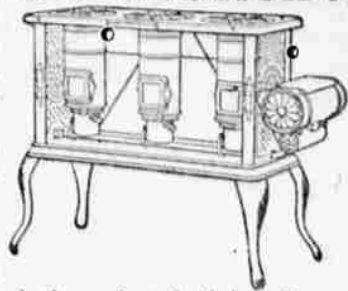

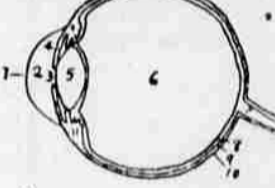
DEATH RESULTS FROM QUARREL OVER FIFTY CENTS

THE EYE AND ITS CARE.

The Coats of The Eye.

The eyeball has three coats, the Sclerotic or outer coat, the Choroid or middle coat, and the Retina, or inner coat. The sclerotic coat is a thick, tough, white, fibrous structure, the front part of which is commonly called "the white of the eye". This is covered with a very thin, transparent membrane called the Conjunctiva, which gives to the white of the eye a brilliant luster. The sclerotic joins the cornea in front and the optic nerve in back, where it is the thickest. The next or middle coat, the choroid, is composed of a dense network of capillaries and veins. Between these are many cells containing dark pigment. This coat extends as far forward as the ciliary muscle and crystalline lens where it forms a little plated frill around the lens, called the ciliary processes. The third, or inner coat, is the Retina, this is a direct continuation of the optic nerve, which comes from the brain. The retina lines the whole interior of the eye, as far forward as the ciliary processes where it ends in a jagged margin. This is the nervous membrane of the eye, and may be compared to the sensitive plate of a camera because the picture of the object looked at is imprinted upon it. From the retina the message is conveyed to the brain by means of the Optic nerve.

At the entrance of the optic nerve or Pons Opticus, there is no vision and this is called the blind spot. In a direct line with the pupil is a depression in the retina and here vision is most keen. This is why, when we are looking at an object, it stands out most distinctly and the objects to the side, above, and below it are less distinct. The retina is extremely thin, semi-transparent, and composed of many layers. Next week the emmetropic or normal eye-ball will be described.

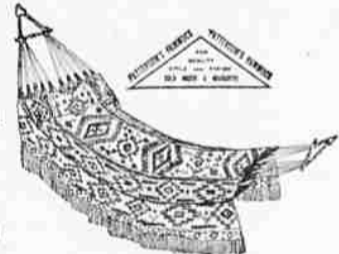
