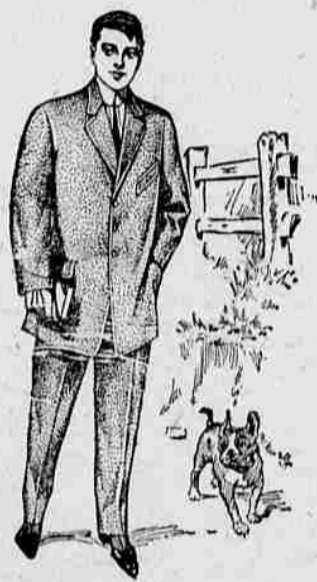

Flag day was observed in Eugene today by a number of citizens, but the observance was not as general as desired by the G. A. R.

Otto Kauffman is repainting and renovating the interior of his confectionery store and lunch place preparatory to occupying the new Beckwith block with a part of his business.

R. L. Sabin, of Portland, today began suit in the circuit court of Lane county against James L. Craig to recover money. F. M. DeNeffe and A. C. Woodcock are attorneys for the plaintiff.

F. E. Dunn made a trip to Portland this week to order the plate glass and other materials for the improvement of his store front, the work of which will begin in a few days.

One of the steam rollers used by the Warren Construction Company in their paving operations here is being shipped to Salem, where it will be similarly employed. The company will hire the city's roller for extra work here when occasion demands.

The county commissioners' court this forenoon made the order declaring that prohibition exists in Lane county, by virtue of the vote cast for it at the June election, 770 more votes being cast for prohibition than were cast against it.
