

## BURROW'S KEY NOTE ADDRESS IGNORES PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT

Chicago, June 15.—Considerable alarm has been caused by the announcement that Temporary Chairman Burrows, who has prepared a keynote speech of 18,000 words, has practically ignored President Roosevelt. Burrows will be called upon by friends of Taft to modify his speech and introduce a complimentary reference to the president at an early point in his address.

The big Coliseum will be made up of representatives from every state and territory of the Union, as well as the more recently acquired island possessions, and be called to order tomorrow noon by Harry S. New, chairman of the Republican national committee, who will introduce Senator Julius Caesar Burrows, of Missouri, the temporary chairman. In assuming the gavel, Burrows will make an extended speech designed to steady the keynote of the coming campaign and present the principles and achievements of the Republican party during its many years of existence. The temporary chairman will then announce the important committees. There is some discussion as to the probable duration of the convention, some of the leaders holding to the original estimate of five days. As soon as the work of the credentials committee is completed nominations for president will be in order.

## ANTI-INJUNCTION PLANK STRADDLES THE QUESTION

Chicago, June 15.—The anti-injunction plank in the Republican platform as passed upon in Washington is as follows: "We declare for such amendment of the statutes of procedure in federal courts, with respect to the use of writs of injunction, as will on the one hand prevent the summary issues of such orders without proper consideration, and on the other will preserve undiminished the power of the courts to enforce their process, to the end that justice may be done at all times and to all parties." There is much speculation as to exactly what the terms mean. Its opponents declare it was undoubtedly cover any proposed law containing the word "injunction," and arguments against the plank are being made by many members of congress to prospective members of the resolutions committee. Speaker Cannon is working hard to have the plank modified. The defenders of the plank insist that there is nothing in its terms to be feared.

## WEBER-BUSSEL CANNERY WILL BE ERECTED

SEATTLE CONCERN WILL BE READY FOR NEXT YEAR'S CROP IN LAKE COUNTY

C. B. Bussell, president, W. Lair Hill, vice president and general attorney, and J. B. Moran, general superintendent of the Weber-Bussell Canning Company, a big fruit concern with headquarters at Seattle, are in the city negotiating for a site for the company's proposed cannery here. It will be remembered that the Guard early this year announced that the company would erect such a plant in Eugene this spring and have it completed in time to handle this year's crop, but owing to the financial panic of last fall the beginning of work on the plant was postponed. Mr. Bussell, however, informed The Guard this morning that his company will now go ahead with the enterprise and have the cannery ready for next year's crop of fruit and vegetables. The site has not yet been definitely settled upon. Mr. Bussell stated that the cannery will have a capacity of 30,000 or 40,000 cases of fruit each season, and will employ a large number of persons. The company has just completed a cannery at Newberg and one at Freewater, Oregon, and two plants at North Yakima, Sumner and Puyallup, Wash. The one at North Yakima is as large as any on the coast. The one just completed at Newberg has a capacity of between 50,000 and 80,000 cases. The last installment of machinery has just been received at the plant, and will be installed at once, ready for the first early fruit. Asked as to the fruit outlook, Mr. Bussell stated that everything looked very good. The late frosts did some damage, but taken for a whole the crop will be large.

## KANSAS CITY FLOOD CONDITION IS SERIOUS

Kansas City, June 15.—The flood condition here is serious. There has been no further rise, but the Missouri is holding back the Kaw so that the Armourdale district is one vast lake, as is the wholesale district in the west bottom of Kansas City, Missouri. The Kaw will not commence to fall until the crest of the flood in the Missouri has passed. The continuation of the flood is having a damaging effect on many of the old brick buildings in the flooded districts, some of the structures being undermined, and will doubtless be condemned as unfit for further occupancy. The forecaster predicts further rains, but it is not expected that they will have any appreciable bad effect. Topeka, June 15.—The flood is gradually receding, but the railroad situation shows little improvement. Worst Is Over. St. Joseph, Mo., June 15.—The Missouri river has been stationary since Sunday, and it is thought the worst is over.
