Too many politicians live in glass houses for throwing stones at shady campaign contributions to become a popular pastime among them.

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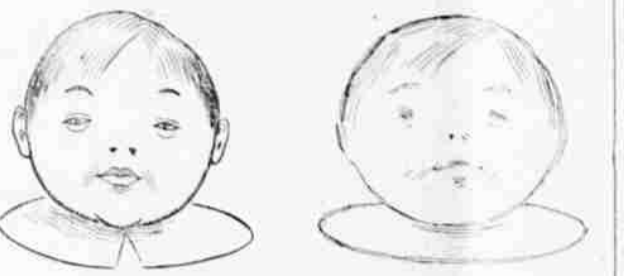
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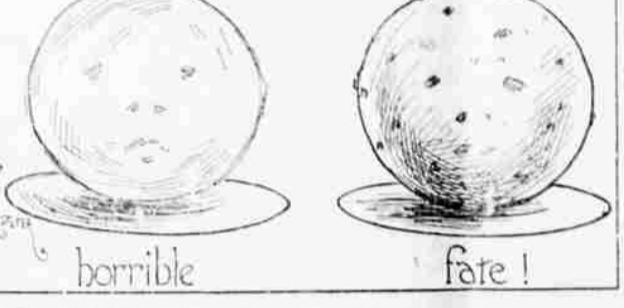
