Now, that's exactly what I ask the merchants to do—get it up themselves and boost it for all it's worth. I am merely here to show them how to get up a Market Day. Then, again, another merchant's excuse for not helping or subscribing was that the commercial club should get it up. Who is there on the commercial club that knows how to get up a Market Day? What merchant in town is going to be patriotic enough to leave his business and work, and advance money to get it up, even if he knew how? That patriotic feeling is not displayed here. But I shall buy them a fine ring, and I assure you it will be out of a booster jewelry store. I see by the papers the brewers are going to boycott the farmers who live in a prohibition district by not buying their barley and hops. Don't you see how monthly Market Days will be of advantage to the farmer? He need not look for any one man to buy his stock and produce, but a well organized

Market Day will attract buyers from all over once a month, and create competition, and the farmer is insured the highest market price. Now, it is a fact in La Grande, Pondleton and Baker City, where I was instrumental in installing market days, the Swift and Armour people opened bank accounts for the purchase of live stock from the farmers. Don't that bring money to your town? Think this over, get on your boosting, stop knocking, as the farmers are with me in this deal, and they are going to peg out the knackers. No use doing nothing for no one, who won't do nothing for you."—Sis Hopkins.

The Associated Students of the University of Oregon will send "Bill" Hayward, Oregon's famous trainer, East this summer. Hayward will take six weeks in the Yale summer school, perfecting himself in the most approved methods in training and physical culture and studying the best forms of gymnasium apparatus and equipment, and will also inspect a large number of the most prominent universities and other gymnasiums of the Eastern States. Hayward will be away from Oregon for a couple of months or more, and will have charge of the training of Dan Kelly and probably Forrest Smithson for the Olympic games. He will accompany the American team to London.

**HUSTON BEST SPRINTER ON THE PACIFIC COAST**

In speaking of the recent P. N. A. games in Portland upon the return of the Olympic track team, the San Francisco Chronicle said: "Huston, of Oregon, showed great speed and the Olympic men declare he is the best 100-yard man on the coast. He ran the 100 in 10 1-5 seconds in a track which, being new, was badly cut up before the final 100 yards. In the 220-yard dash Gerheart won handily, beating Martin of Spokane, the runner who is credited with covering the distance in 21 1-5 seconds, a time equal to the world's record, held by B. J. Wefers. As Gerheart's time on Saturday was 22 2-5 seconds, it is probable that the watches at Spokane were not held just right."

Idaho—W. J. Carter has been appointed a Forest Guard on the Weiser National Forest.

Nevada—J. P. Matthews has been appointed a Forest Guard on the Monitor National Forest.

Oregon—U. S. G. Turner has been appointed a Forest Guard on the Blue Mountains (E) National Forest.

James L. Furnish, Ralph Taylor and Archie O. Knowles have been appointed Forest Guards on the Cascade (Willamette) National Forest.

George H. West has been appointed a forest guard on the Cascade (Mazama) national forest, and Smith L. Taylor on the Cascade (Willamette) national forest.

E. Barnes and Walter Allison have been appointed forest guards on the Blue Mountain (E.) nation forest.

Miss E. A. Newell has been appointed a clerk (temporary) on the Cascade (Willamette) national forest.

Montana—J. K. Hubbard and D. R. Litchner have been appointed Forest Guards on the Cabinet (S.) National Forest.

Washington—O. E. Kerstetter has been appointed a Forest Guard on the Washington (Wenatchee) National Forest.

These appointments are made to meet the increased demands of the Forest service work due to the opening of the grazing season, resumption of active lumbering operations on forests, and permanent improvement work after the cessation of practically all business of this kind during the winter months.
