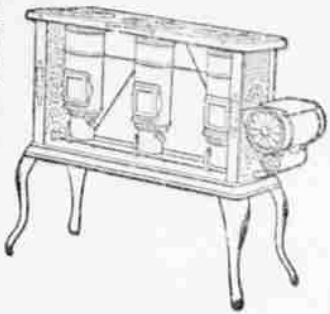

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS MEET IN PORTLAND

One hundred and three subordinate lodges in the domain of Oregon are represented in Portland and will assemble at Pythian hall, Eleventh and Alder streets, at 10 o'clock this morning to attend the grand lodge, Knights of Pythias. There are approximately 300 delegates present, and more are expected this morning. Also at 10 o'clock the grand lodge of Pythian Sisters will meet in the hall in the Abington building in annual session. Various plans of entertainment have been arranged for the entertainment of the visitors and in the last is a banquet to be served probably at the Commercial Club, although the place has not been definitely decided upon.

Smead, of Heppner; grand inner guard, H. A. Dunbar, of Eugene; grand outer guard, E. L. Fraxer, of Independence; grand trustees, Emil Waldman (one year), L. M. Curl (two years), M. F. Davis (three years); grand tribunal, Frank T. Wightman, chief tribune, of Salem; L. B. Reeder, associate tribune, of Portland; George E. Swatford, associate tribune, of Elgin; Oregonian.

SIXTY-FIVE HUNDRED MEN FOR ENCAMPMENT

Seattle, Wash., June 15.—The largest number of soldiers ever assembled in this part of the country will participate in the maneuvers at American Lake in August. There will be 6500 troops, 3000 of whom will be regulars and 3500 militiamen, and they will come from Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and a few from the Presidio in California. The federal troops will come from Idaho, Montana and Washington. The militia from Idaho and Washington will camp at American Lake from August 2 to 12, and the Montana and Idaho militia from August 16 to 31. The Oregon militia comprises a regiment and a battalion of infantry and a battery of artillery, in all 1100 men, while the infantry regiments from Montana and Idaho each comprise 750 men. The Washington militia includes a full regiment of infantry, a troop of cavalry, and a signal corps, comprising in all 300 men. Brigadier-General D. H. Brush will be in command of the maneuvers this summer. Fort Lawton, in Seattle, will be the base hospital, and all sick and injured regulars will be sent there.

BURNED BOSWELL HOTEL MAY NOT BE REBUILT

Drain, Or., June 15.—The hotel building at the Boswell Mineral Springs, two miles south of here, was burned to the ground about 1 o'clock yesterday morning. The cause of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed it was due to the overturning of a lamp. The loss is estimated at \$15,000, which includes some valuable belongings to Mrs. Boswell. There was no insurance. The resort, which is known for its cures of rheumatism, was run by Captain Boswell, for about 20 years, until his death about a year ago, since which time it has been run by his widow. It is not probable that the hotel will be rebuilt.
