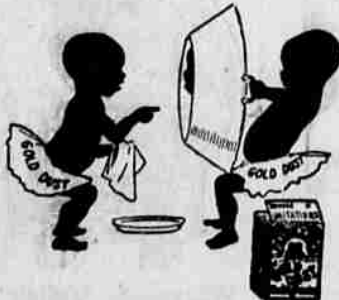

ONE EUGENE MAN'S VIEWS.
 (North Bend Harbor.)
 In a personal letter from a friend residing in Eugene, among other things, he uses the following language in summing up the political situation: "I was just getting ready to start back to my old home in Iowa Tuesday evening, and then the news came that the University appropriation had carried, and on the top of that, the report that Cummins had carried Iowa over Allison, and I backed out. I have thought of it since, though. We used to laugh at Kansas, and most everybody had the idea that politics down there was three-fourths theory and the rest whisks, but the Oregon brand makes Kansas look like a deuce of hearts in a bottled spade flush. An initiative and referendum measure that means that the people of Oregon are amusing themselves with a lot of toy legislators, and incidentally paying them salaries, to make laws that they expect later to romp in and make mince-meat of, a re-call measure by which any officer can be sent back to the tall and uncut whenever he tramps on an influential politician's toes, a corrupt practices bill that jugs you for giving a man a cigar on election day, and as a crowning insult a Democratic Senator from a state of thirty thousand Republican majority—although there are dark and bloody hints being promulgated that such may not be the case. It is a shame the single tax measure didn't pass—it would have harmonized so well with the rest of the political scenery. I think that after this when I see a politician coming down the street, I will take the other side. I carry my change loose in my pockets, and wear my watch with a fob, and so feel that I owe myself some precaution."
 There was a good deal of excitement in Eugene, over the university appropriation measure, and for a while it looked as if it were going to be snowed under, but rallied at the last and pulled through. We had some campaign here, the wet and dry question, and the ex-saloon keepers were a good deal worked up over it for a while, but prohibition carried by a big vote."

WE STAND CORRECTED.

 The Eugene Guard has not given profound study to the subject of cerebral disorders. It takes a view of an important question which indicates a shallow investigation. It says: "Now that the people of Oregon have voted in favor of scattering the state institutions, Pendleton is pulling for a branch asylum. Regretting the necessity of opposing an enterprising town as the Umatilla metropolis, we feel it our duty to call attention to the fact that the asylum should always be located in Linn or Marion counties, where its largest patronage should come from."

Clark, Justice of the Peace in and for Creswell Precinct, Lane County, Oregon, that at the said election the total number of votes cast in the precinct of Springfield, in Lane county, Oregon, on the question, "For and Against stock running at large," is and was 339 votes, and the said number of votes cast in the said Springfield precinct "Against stock running at large" is and was 286 votes. It appearing from said abstract that the result of said vote is and was 233 votes against stock running at large, and that the majority against stock running at large in said Springfield precinct is and was 233 votes.
 Therefore, in compliance with Section 4245 of the General Laws of Oregon, passed by the legislature of the state of Oregon in the year 1907, notice is hereby given that after 60 days from the date of this notice it will be unlawful for stock to run at large in said Springfield precinct, Lane County, Oregon, under penalty of \$10 for the first offense and \$20 for each and every subsequent offense, to be recovered from the owner of the stock in civil action by the name of the State of Oregon before a Justice of the peace of the precinct in which such owner or keeper, or either of them, may reside, and such penalty shall be for the benefit of, and when collected paid into, the common school fund of the county in which such action is brought within sixty days after such amount is proved to be at large.
