QUICK AUTO TRIP TO PORTLAND

J. O. Storey and party, who left here yesterday afternoon in their Stoddard Dayton 45-horse-power motor car, wired to J. H. Blumhagen that they arrived at Portland at 8:30 last evening, stopping 20 minutes at Monroe, 19 minutes at Corvallis and 49 minutes at Salem en route for Eugene and lunch, making the actual running time 5 hours and 50 minutes, about as fast as the Southern Pacific trains make the distance between the two cities. Halsey, June 16.—Yorn Baber, a young man who lives three miles south of Halsey, drove to Harrisburg with a friend named Robert Cogswell Sunday, and while he was absent his wife, aged about 25 years, hitched up a team and taking her clothes only came to Halsey. She left the team and wagon at a livery stable, asking the proprietor to phone her husband to come and get them. Everything indicates that the young woman ran away, but it is not known whether she boarded a train here or not. There was quite a large sum of money in the house, but she took none of it. Her husband took the northbound train yesterday to search for her, but did not see where he was going. Mrs. Baber bore a good name and no one who knew her believes there is another man in the case.

Obituary.

Rev. Andrew M. Sweeney was born November 11, 1841, in Jackson County, Ind., and moved with his parents to Davis county, Mo., in 1848. He was a soldier in the civil war, enlisting in 1861 and serving during the entire war in the Union army, his service being mostly in Missouri. He united with the Christian church in 1866 and became a minister in that church, being ordained in 1871.

He was married to Miss Belle Terry November 11, 1872, at Gallatin, Mo., and as a result of that union eight children were born, of which seven are living; the oldest and two other sons are in Canada, three sons reside at home in Eugene, and the only daughter, Mrs. J. A. Powell, resides south of Cottage Grove.

Rev. Sweeney moved to Nebraska in 1877, from thence to Washington in 1885, where he was pastor of the First Christian church of Tacoma, which was built during his pastorate. He came to Oregon in 1887, and moved to Canada in 1888, returning to Oregon in 1904. He has three brothers and sisters surviving, one brother and two sisters in Eugene and the others are in Missouri. He died June 15, 1908. The funeral service will be held from the Christian church on Thursday, June 18, at 2 p. m., and interment will be in the Masonic cemetery.

NOTICE OF SALE OF WATER BONDS

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 734, passed by the common council on the 5th day of May, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 6th day of May, 1908, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city recorder in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city, or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.

That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in denominations of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will become due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city.

That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids.

That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of the act, "To re-incorporate the city of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18, 1906, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 18th day of April, 1908.
