DYNAMITE CHARGE DAMAGES MORMONS' RESIDENCE

FRONT PORCH OF BUILDING DEMOLISHED, BUT LITTLE FURTHER DAMAGE DONE

MRS. HOWELL AND MORMON ELDERS THINK IT WORTH OF PERSONS OPPOSED TO THEIR FAITH WHO WANT TO GET RID OF THEM--POLICE THINK INTENDED TO ONLY FRIGHTEN THEM

The residence of Mrs. E. E. Howell, at 115 Washington street, corner of West First, was damaged by an explosion of dynamite or giant powder this morning at 1:40 o'clock. A charge had been placed under the front porch, and the explosion demolished the porch, broke out all the window panes in the front part of the building, and otherwise damaged the house. None of the occupants of the residence were injured.

Besides Mrs. Howell and her three children, her brother, W. S. Buchanan, and his five children, and two Mormon elders, C. L. Dunford and C. J. Williams, lived there. Mrs. Howell is also a Mormon, and it is believed by her and the other occupants of the house that religious fanatics opposed to the Mormon faith placed the charge under the porch in an endeavor to kill them. The police officers, however, are inclined to the belief that the explosion was intended simply to frighten them, or it would have been placed further beneath the house. The hole made in the ground by the explosive indicated that it was placed at the outer edge of the porch.

The explosion was heard in all parts of the city, and some who were awakened by it thought it might have been an early morning blast at the rock quarry of the paving company. Those living nearby, though, knew that it did not come from the quarry and some made an investigation. Quite a crowd was soon on the scene. The police officers were at once notified, and an investigation was started, but absolutely no clue to the misdeed could then or can now be found.

Buchanan and some of his children were sleeping in a tent in the basement at the house, at the time of the explosion. A rock from the foundation was hurled through the tent and it struck the iron bedstead directly over Buchanan's head. Had it gone between the rods of the head of the bed it might have killed him. Elder Williams was sick in bed at the time, having become worn out by overwork, and the shock of the explosion and the excitement made him worse, but he is getting along well today. None of the others who were in the house at the time were affected by the shock except Mrs. Howell, whose nerves were pretty badly shaken.

Mrs. Howell came to Eugene from Monmouth about three years ago and has resided here since. She originally came from Salt Lake City and has always been a Mormon. She is a widow. Elders Williams and Dunford have been in Eugene for the past several months, and have been holding street meetings every Saturday night since coming here. They have been working all through the county in the interests of their church. Mrs. Howell has been boarding them and her brother and his children. The family has a good reputation and the only thing that as far as can be learned is their religion.

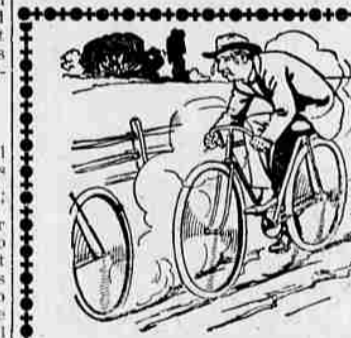
