University of Oregon News

The Undergraduate students with a few exceptions have left for their homes over the state and Pacific Northwest to spend their summer vacations in a variety of ways.

The climax of Commencement week will come Tuesday night when the Fall-Blockian Oratorical contest will be held in Villard Hall.

On Tuesday in the morning will be held the Alumni reunion and business meeting at 9 a. m. in Villard Hall.

On Monday a field day on the campus will be pulled off. In the evening will be the graduating exercises of the school of music.

Rev. Herbert S. Johnson, son of President Johnson, a layhood resident of Eugene, a graduate of the University and now a pastor of a prominent church in Massachusetts, will preach the baccalaureate sermon on Sunday morning at 11 o'clock in Villard Hall.

Miss Eva Stinson will be back to fill her old position as vocal teacher after a year's study in New York. Mrs. Schuecker and Mrs. Katharine Ward Pope will not be available for the next year.

Editor Asks Credit. Considerable discussion was created this week by the issue of the Oregon Weekly, which devoted nearly half of its entire space to an argument why the editor should have either college credit or a salary. Some students agree, some do not, but the faculty seems quite indubitate.
