

## FILIPINO CIRCULAR ATTACKS AMERICANS

Manila, June 22.—An anti-American circular has been issued here, signed by the Philippine National Society and denounces Americans saying that they have brought tyranny instead of liberty and that their purpose is to rob and enslave the Filipinos. It calls Americans shameless, dishonest, drunkards, and attacks the morality of the American women and accuses the government of graft.

Peding an open revolution it says a campaign involving the assassination of individual Americans, and burning their homes, and coming with "long life to the Filipinos" and "death to the Americans."

### SENATOR BOURNE WILL HELP TAFT

Chicago, June 21.—Senator Bourne was asked today for his views upon the nomination of Secretary Taft, and he was not prepared as yet to express his opinion. He said possibly he might issue a statement.

Discussing the matter informally, Senator Bourne said, of course he would support Taft, but feared that it would be difficult to elect him. Questions of labor and colored voters' disaffection could be overcome, but the idea of the candidate being a President was dangerous and would jeopardize republican success. Senator Bourne will go from here to Washington and expects to have several conferences at Oyster Bay with the president and then go to Europe.

### CHINESE CITY DAMAGED BY THE FLOOD

Hong Kong, June 22.—The city of Wa Choo has been inundated by an abnormal rise of seventy feet in the river. Many casualties are reported and great damage was done.

## TWO GUILTY TWO NOT GUILTY OF LAND FRAUDS

Washington, June 21.—Hyde & Schneider were found guilty; Benson and Diamond not guilty. The jury came into the court from case this afternoon and rendered the verdict. The court thanked the members and released them from further service. The jury had been out since one o'clock Friday afternoon.

Washington, June 22.—The jury in the Hyde-Benson-Schneider-Diamond case reported to the court this morning they were unable to agree and were sent back for further consideration. The court was indicated four years ago for alleged conspiracy to defraud the government of land.

### LABOR LEADERS WILL NOT SUPPORT TAFT.

Chicago, June 20.—Local leaders of union labor declared today that the organized workmen of the country will not support Taft. They said he was still the original injunction judge; that he had not changed his opinions on the question of the relation of the courts to struggles between capital and labor, and that the anti-injunction plank in the Republican platform was a make-shift measure intended to deceive and hoodwink the laboring classes.

"Taft is not acceptable to the workman," said E. N. Nielsen, secretary of the Chicago Federation of Labor, "and he will not have the workman's support at the polls. Union labor is not deceived by any public utterance that Taft has made since the time he sat as a federal judge and used the writ of injunction to deprive the workman of his rights."

## CORONER'S JURY SAYS CRIMINAL NEGLIGENCE

DR. DE BAR ACCUSED AT INQUEST HELD OVER BODY OF CLIFFORD VICKERS WHO DIED SUDDENLY IN PHYSICIAN'S OFFICE.

Coroner V. T. Godron this forenoon held an inquest over the body of Clifford Vickers, the Denver youth, who died suddenly in Dr. Geo. O'B De Bar's office Friday forenoon after the doctor had given him a treatment of antitoxine for asthma. The jury accuses the physician of criminal negligence. E. T. Vickers, father of the boy, Dr. F. W. Prindle and Dr. T. W. Harris, besides Dr. De Bar, were examined as witnesses. The verdict of the jury is as follows:

"In the coroner's court for Lane county, State of Oregon.

"In the matter of the inquest over the body of Clifford Vickers, deceased.

"We, the jury empanelled and sworn to pass upon the death of Clifford Vickers, deceased, find as follows:

"1. That the name of the deceased is Clifford Vickers.

"2. That the age of the deceased is 15 years, 10 months and 21 days.

"3. That he was a white male person and a resident of Denver, Colo.

"4. That he died in Eugene, Lane county, Oregon, on the 19th day of June, 1908, at 3:30 o'clock.

"5. That his death was caused by criminal carelessness of Dr. Geo. O'B De Bar, said Dr. De Bar at time of giving antitoxine knowing the probable fatal consequences. Also, that he further administered this anti-toxine without consulting the father of the deceased, of the probable outcome which the hypodermic injection might have with a patient affected with asthma; or without calling any other physician in consultation before administering the said antitoxine.

## REPUBLICANS IN RETREAT SAYS BRYAN

Lincoln, Neb., June 20.—Under the caption, "In Full Retreat," William J. Bryan in the next issue of the Commonwealth will discuss the Republican National Convention as follows: "The Republicans who attended the national convention as spectators and joined in the demonstration in favor of President Roosevelt and Senator La Follette must have felt indignant as they watched the pants-stricken delegates running over each other in order to get away from La Follette's reforms, some of which have been endorsed by the President himself. Copies of Wisconsin, representing the La Follette platform, brought in a minority report signed by himself alone. Fifty-two members of the committee signed the majority report and one signed the minority report. The Republican party will find a ratio of 52 to 1, a very embarrassing one to deal with in the coming campaign." In the same vein he alludes to Cooper's plank.

"How fortunate," says Bryan, "it was lucky that Taft's letter was finally discovered and published. Who will deny on this subject, that the Republican party is retreating?"

### TAFT WILL VISIT PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT

New York, June 22.—Secretary Taft arrived here today and left for New Haven where he will meet Mrs. Taft. He expects to call on the President at Oyster Bay Friday in company with General Luke E. Wright, his successor as secretary of war.

### Reception at New Haven.

New Haven, June 22.—Mr. Taft, accompanied by Judge Hollister of Cincinnati arrived here this afternoon. He was given an enthusiastic reception at the station. Later in the afternoon he attended a meeting of the Yale corporation, of which he is a member.

### Taft's Narrow Escape.

Denton, O., June 21.—Secretary Taft had a narrow escape tonight from being involved in a serious wreck on the Pennsylvania Flyer, which was carrying him East. Prompt action of the towerman in a signal station a third of a mile east of Coshocton, and of the engineer of the Flyer, alone averted what might have been a dreadful accident. As the train was speeding along at the rate of 50 miles an hour, the piston rod on the left side of the locomotive broke short off. Almost instantly the cylinder of the engine was cracked by the unmanageable rod.

### Tower Man Stops Train.

The train was just approaching a tower east of Coshocton. The operator saw that something serious was wrong and threw down a signal to stop the train. The engineer applied the emergency brakes and the train of its own volition stopped in a short space.

The accident occurred at 6:30 o'clock when there of the passenger on the train were at dinner on the dining car. Few if any could have been hurt, their escape had been from an awful accident.

Next he alludes to the defect of the plank recommending the valuation of the railroads by a vote of nearly 45 to 1.

"Yet President Roosevelt has favored this very same opinion. Here is a retreat on the railroad question."

Bryan says the injunction plank is a retreat from the position taken by President Roosevelt and Taft in their speeches.

"The President advocated the income tax as a means of preventing swollen fortunes and of equating the burdens of government. The Republican platform is silent on the subject. Was the President right? Was the convention wrong in not endorsing him? Will the Republican voters follow the President or will they follow the Republican organization in extending from it?"

Including the 300,000,000,000 the inheritance tax and the corporation tax is silent. Bryan says:

"Did the President give a false alarm, as this question is by the Republican party, would a retreat?"

Bryan asserts that the President in
