STRIVEN FOR IMPROVEMENT FOR 25 YEARS

PEOPLE OF SUSLAW COUNTRY HAVE BEEN VERY PATIENT WITH GOVERNMENT, BUT WILL NOW TAKE MATTER OF JETTIES IN THEIR OWN HANDS.

An old proverb says "The Lord helps those who help themselves." For twenty-five years and more the people of Florence and the surrounding country have urged upon congress the necessity of improving the bar at the mouth of the Siuslaw river so that ocean-going vessels can pass in or out of the harbor at any time, instead of having to wait days or even weeks for favorable conditions of the ocean and the bar under which the vessels can cross the bar in safety, says the Florence West.

About fifteen years ago an appropriation was granted and the work of building a jetty on the north side of the river was commenced. Several small appropriations were granted for continuing the construction, but the work was suspended about eight years ago (and since that time our appeals for funds have been turned down by the national government). In fact the policy of the general government for the past eight or ten years has been to concentrate all the work of harbor improvement on a few of the larger streams and bays and leave the smaller places without anything.

Necessary to Deepen Channel. The reason given by the officials for pursuing this course is that the larger vessels now in use draw more water and this renders it necessary

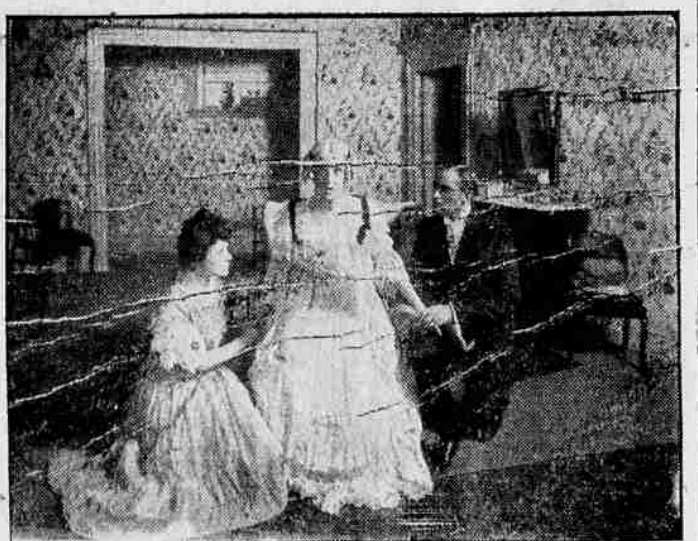
cent, and perhaps lower. But at five per cent the interest on \$100,000 bonds will amount to \$5,000 per year. To pay this at the present valuation on the property in this district would require a tax of a little less than 2 1/2 mills on a dollar. A man owning property assessed at \$1000 would only pay \$2.50 each year. That is reckoning that the valuation remains the same as at present. But when we consider that if the harbor is improved so that vessels can go in and out without delay, that our property will advance rapidly in value, we can see at once that the tax levy necessary to raise the interest would be proportionately less. If the property doubles in value, as it probably would in five years after the harbor is improved, only one half the rate of tax would be required. Or if thought better the amount not needed to pay interest could be placed in a sinking fund and used to pay off the bonds when they become due.

In either case the amount each man would have to pay is so small that nobody would feel it, and when we consider the great benefit it would be to everybody to have the harbor improved we can not see how anybody can oppose the proposition.

to deepen the channels of the streams to accommodate these larger vessels. Hoping that congress could be persuaded soon to take the matter up again, our people have sent petition after petition setting forth the needs of the place; commercial organizations of both Oregon and California have passed resolutions urging congress to make the necessary improvements of the harbor; our merchants and mill owners have written hundreds of letters giving statistics of the business and of the natural resources of the country tributary to this stream but all without effect. Congress has turned a deaf ear to our appeals and has refused to appropriate a dollar.

People to Help Themselves. At length despairing of obtaining any assistance in this way from the national government for some years at least, our people are now trying to devise ways and means to improve the harbor themselves. As time passes and the country is becoming settled up the necessity for harbor improvement is steadily increasing. The plan which is proposed now is for the territory tributary to the Siuslaw river to issue bonds for a certain amount, perhaps \$100,000, and have this sum expended under the direction of a competent board in the work of building a jetty at the mouth of the river.

It is hoped that if our people will raise this amount to commence the work that congress will appropriate enough money to complete the jetty. If our people show in this way that they are ready to contribute from their own means it will prove a strong argument with those in authority and will have a great influence in determining what action congress will take on the question.

As we stated last week, the county court has already made application to the engineers' department for permission to build the jetty according to plans drawn by the government engineers some years ago. It is expected the legislature, at its next session, will pass a special act authorizing the people to vote upon the question and providing for the issue and sale of the bonds.

Property Valued at \$2,000,000. In regard to the amount of the property in the territory, we are informed that the assessed valuation of the property in that portion of Lane county, as shown by the assessor's books for the year 1907, is \$2,000,000. School districts are allowed to issue bonds not to exceed five per cent of their assessed valuation. Reckoning five per cent on \$2,000,000 would give \$100,000 or more than the amount which it is proposed to raise in this way.

NOTICE OF SALE OF WATER BONDS

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of and in conformity to ordinance number 734, passed by the common council on the 5th day of May, 1908, and approved by the mayor on the 5th day of May, 1908, the common council of the city of Eugene will receive sealed proposals at the office of the city recorder in Eugene, Oregon, for the purchase of three hundred thousand dollars in water bonds of said city, or any part thereof, up to the hour of 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, July 7, 1908, and that said proposals will be opened and considered by the council at said time.

That the city of Eugene proposes to sell the said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds to the highest bidder therefor in denominations of from one hundred to one thousand dollars, as the purchaser may desire; that said bonds are to bear interest at the rate bid, not to exceed 5 per cent per annum; said interest payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year from their date until paid; that said three hundred thousand dollars of water bonds will become due and payable by the city of Eugene as follows: On the first day of January, 1948, principal and interest payable at a place to be agreed upon by purchaser and city.

That said bonds shall not be sold for less than their par value; that in addition to the general obligation of the said city, the said bonds when sold shall be a first and exclusive lien on all lands, rights-of-way, easements, water rights, pipe lines, structures and appliances of every kind composing the water system to be secured with the money derived from the sale of said bonds; that the common council reserve the right of rejecting any and all bids.

That the said bonds will be issued and disposed of under and pursuant to the terms of the act, "To re-incorporate the city of Eugene, and to repeal all acts and parts of acts in conflict herewith," filed in the office of the secretary of state February 18, 1905, and the amendments thereto passed and enacted by the people of the city of Eugene on the 18th day of April, 1908.
