BARTNETT IS FOUND GUILTY ON FIRST BALLOT

San Francisco, June 22.—Walter J. Bartnett, ex-vice-president of the suspended California Safe Deposit & Trust Company and administrator of the estate of Mrs. Ellen M. Colton, this afternoon was found guilty of embezzling securities and bonds owned by the estate to the value of \$21,700. The jury was out less than 50 minutes and reached a verdict on the first ballot. Bartnett was recommended to the mercy of the court and Judge Conley fixed 10 a. m., June 30, as the time for pronouncing sentence.
Secured by Prosecutor.
San Francisco, June 22.—Edward, car, thief and liar were the epithets applied to Walter J. Bartnett, accused with wrecking of the California Safe Deposit & Trust Company, by Assistant District Attorney Cook in one of the fiercest investigations ever hurled against a man at the bar today.
Cook went at length into the evidence that had been introduced in the case and frequently pointing his finger at the defendants he shouted his scorching invective and unremoved through it all.
Cook asked for a conviction of the first count in the indictment on which Bartnett is being tried, that of stealing \$21,700 as special administrator of the estate of the late Ellen M. Colton.
"That man Bartnett," cried Cook, pointing at the accused man, "is guilty of the worst kind of breach of faith. He has proven false to the trust put in him by the dead. He is guilty of a breach of the law's office and gentlemen, upon your verdict, depends the final confidence of this city."
Cook declared that he was no defender of J. Dalsell Brown. Brown, Bartnett and Treadwell, he said, are responsible for the wrecking of the bank. Brown is serving a term in prison. The prosecutor said that Bartnett bought the Colton securities here from New York for the express purpose of hypothecating them to help out the shaken bank.

ROOSEVELT AIDS GRAFT HUNTERS

San Francisco, June 22.—"You have heartbreaking difficulties with which to contend. You have to fight, not only the banded powers of evil, but the supineness and indifference of many good men upon whose zealous support you had a right to feel that you could rely." Thus writes President Roosevelt in a letter to Rudolph Spreckels, which has just been made public, offering encouragement to those who are conducting the graft prosecution.
"Do not be discouraged; do not flinch," he continues in his lengthy letter. "You are in a fight for plain decency, for the plain democracy of the plain people, who believe in honesty and in fair dealing as between man and man."

WOMEN EXPELLED FROM UNIVERSITY.

St. Petersburg, June 22.—Czar Nicholas today promulgated one of the most sweeping measures ever issued in Russia, by which all women students are ordered expelled from Russian universities. The order affects 2,229 women, many of whom are fearing graduation, and the bitterness is widespread.
The Czar issued the instructions to Minister Von Kaufman, chief of the bureau of public instruction. The edict also sets forth that hereafter no women shall be admitted to any of the universities.
It is announced that the action is the result of activity on the part of the women students in revolutionary movements. The women have been open in their encouragement of the men students in their attack upon the government.

DYING MINISTER RECEIVED REASON AND FORGAVE SLAYER

Herman, Mo., June 21.—"I had forgiven them, they know me what they do," said Rev. Valentine Strauss who was yesterday shot and killed by Max Kniebeche, a farmer and member of his congregation.
Rev. M. Strauss was pastor of the Evangelical church of Straupe, 12 miles southwest of this city. For several months he had shown signs of insanity. He had stocked the church and parsonage with all sorts of weapons and ammunition. All attempts to remove the guns were violently insane a week ago. His wife, in terror, notified the neighbors of his condition and meetings were held at which it was determined to get him into a sanitarium.
Preacher Opens Fire.
Yesterday a number of farmers were discussing ways and means to disarm him when he came upon them suddenly. He had secretly left the parsonage, which was being watched and opened hostilities by shooting through the windows of the home of Henry Zastrow, his nearest neighbor. The Zastrow family fled and the preacher disappeared.

Then he suddenly emerged from a cornfield upon the men at Fromm's blacksmith shop. He carried two guns and several revolvers were belted around his waist. Without warning he opened fire and Kniebeche who was also armed, discharged a load of birdshot into his body at short range.
Sanity Returns, Forgives.
Strauss ran about 200 yards into the woods. His pursuers came upon him as he was kneeling in prayer. For the first time in months his sanity returned and he realized what had happened. Kniebeche and others knelt in a circle around their dying pastor, who prayed for them and himself as his life sped away. He forgave Kniebeche, who, he said, had done right under the circumstances, and in the midst of his prayer, pitched forward dead.

NINE NEGROES SHOT TO DEATH IN TEXAS.

Houston, Tex., June 22.—Nine negroes met death last night at the hands of a mob in the vicinity of Hempfield, in Sabine county. Today both races secured arms and the tension is such tonight that a race clash appears imminent.
The dead:
Jerry Evans, aged 22.
Will Johnson, aged 24.
Mose Spillman, aged 24.
Cleveland Williams, aged 27.
William Manuel, aged 25.
Frank Williams, aged 22.
Two unknown men.
William McCoy.
The lynchings followed the killing of two white men by the negroes. Two weeks ago Hugh Dean and several other white men visited a negro church and schoolhouse, where a dance was in progress, presumably in quest of liquor, it being the custom of some of the negroes to sell whiskey during the progress of such affairs. During the evening Dean was killed and six negroes were held for the killing.
