PORTLANDERS HIGHLY PLEASED WITH EUGENE

THEY ALL HAD AN ENJOYABLE TIME HERE YESTERDAY—DINNER WAS SUCCESSFUL AFFAIR—CARS LOADED WITH FLOWERS AND CHERRIES FOR RETURN TRIP.

The Portland excursionists who spent the day in Eugene yesterday left on their special train for home at 7:15 o'clock last evening amid the cheers and shouts of hundreds of Eugene citizens and music by the band. Every man in the party expressed himself as being delighted with the entertainment accorded them during their brief stay here and all were pleased with the appearance of the city. Those who had made previous visits here were struck with the great strides made by the city along the line of public improvement during the past year.

Before the train started for Portland a committee of ladies from the ladies' auxiliary of the Commercial Club had filled the car seats with beautiful roses and boxes of luscious cherries. This was a surprise to the excursionists and one that was appreciated.

The dinner at the Commercial Club rooms was a success in every particular. Everything was carried out according to program and there was not a dull moment during the entire time the dinner was in progress. Good nature and jollity prevailed throughout. The toasts were excellent. Those not on the program who spoke were H. L. Pittock, one of the owners of the Oregonian; Congressman Hawley, Dr. Albert B. Hart of Harvard University, and John M. Scott, assistant general passenger agent of the S. P. Co.

Concluding remarks.

Many complimentary things were said of Eugene and her people by the visitors during their stay here.

Among them were the following:

Charles Y. Galloway, now state land agent, but formerly a student at the University—"Eugene never looked so well as today, though I have been here many times."

Attorney-General A. M. Crawford expressed his deep regard for the University and for Eugene. "No town in the state," he said, "shows the spirit that pervades this city."

Hon. J. D. Abbott—"When I was here three years ago there was not a good street in your city. Now look at the difference. Your paved streets are excellent."

Hon. W. J. Clemens—"This is the most beautiful town in the state. I am delighted with Eugene."

Congressman W. C. Hawley—"Eugene's streets have a fine appearance. Your depot is splendid. I notice many new buildings going up, an indication of growth and progress."

C. Chapman, a member of Chapman's advertising agency—"Eugene is a coming city, and from an advertising standpoint her enterprise is worthy of a city many times her size."

H. Wittenberg, a prominent business man of Portland complimented the city—"I heard much of Eugene," he said, "but the reality and the improvement of the last two years are a surprise. The only thing I have to say detrimental is that I have had too much to eat."

MRS. TAFT WOULD STOP DIVORCE EVIL.

New York, June 24.—That divorce is the greatest evil of the American nation today is that statement made here by Mrs. William Howard Taft, wife of the republican presidential nominee. All society is agog over some very pointed remarks made by the wife of the man just now uppermost in the public mind.

"Yes, if it were in my power, divorce would be stopped altogether," said Mrs. Taft. "Of course there are cases where separation might be legally granted, but there should be no re-marriage allowed." The laxity of our divorce laws is a menace to the very morals of our nation.

To begin with, if divorces are to be granted at all, there should be an uniform divorce law for all states—for the nation—and there would be no opportunity to evade it as is being done at the present time.

"We might build up the greatest navy in the world so we might have the good will of every ruler on the earth, we might have a credit and commerce unparalleled in the history of nations; but when within the homes of our country is a moral laxity and family ties can be broken up in a twinkling through a process of course—just as one would file a will or deed, then there is a greater danger to the country from a war with foreign nations."

Mrs. Taft declared that she does not believe in a business life for a woman. "A happy marriage is the most useful life for any woman," she said.
