STATE TEACHERS IN CONVENTION

berly on "The Principles of Taxation." The speaker told of the main principles governing taxation, of the inequalities and problems. He said, that in every state in the union, schools have been going forward rapidly without any difficulty, with the exception that it is hard to get enough money. This is the problem that now faces those interested in the public schools of the country. As the situation now stands, many communities are greatly overburdened, while others do not have their share.

Taxation is divided into four kinds, district taxation, town or township taxation, county and state. Mr. Cubberly advocated state taxes on the ground that in all other kinds the inequality is increased. For instance, a great railroad is in one county, and while it draws upon others for freight and traffic, which it does not enter, yet its taxes in most states do not help and but a few sections. So it is with a great corporation, which draws materials from all over the state. But only one little community gets the tax from this organization centralized in one spot, though it is a factor in the welfare of many parts. The state tax obviates such conditions.

Many Speakers.
The corps of lecturers before the meeting is perhaps the best that has ever been gotten together in the state. Besides the leading educators of Oregon there are present: Elwood P. Cubberly from Stanford, Edward Hyatt from California, Dr. Albert Bushnell from Harvard, Effie B. McFadden of the San Francisco State Normal, A. C. Nelson, Superintendent of Public Instruction of Utah. President P. L. Campbell, of the University, President W. J. Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural college, Superintendent Robinson from Portland, and many others are also on the program and taking active part.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION.
