336-WORD TELEGRAM TO REMOVE CONDITION

Dr. Albert Bushnell Hart, professor of American History in Harvard, received while here in Eugene a 336-word telegram which had followed him across the continent from place to place. A fond father requested in a lengthy telegraphic argument that a condition against his son's record in one of the Doctor's classes, be removed.

Dr. Hart delivered the commencement address before the University graduating class, and is a speaker before the state teachers' gathering. If he had not stopped here the message might have followed him around the world, for the Harvard pedagogic is circling the globe.

CHRISTIAN CONVENTION IN SESSION AT TURNER.

Turner, Or., June 25.—The large bell in the Turner Memorial Tabernacle, after a silence of nearly a year, has announced the opening of the yearly convention of the Christian churches of Oregon. After a song service led by W. A. Shaffer of Walla Walla, the Ministerial Association, which occupies the first few days of the convention period, was addressed by E. V. Zollars, president of Oklahoma Christian University, Endicott, Okla. An address was given on the Roman letter, by Professor E. C. Wigmore, of Eugene Bible University. President Zollars spoke on "The Preacher's Office." A discourse on the book of Hosea was delivered by C. H. Hilton, of Milton, Or., and a missionary address by H. T. Sutton of Ashland, Or. The attendance was good and the convention will continue until in July.

BRYAN NOMINATION CINCHEE, SAY SUPPORTERS.

Denver, Col., June 25.—Supporters of William J. Bryan in his contest for a third nomination and the democratic ticket today declared that they were sure of at least 750 votes for him on the first ballot and that they probably will have 800.

A total of 672, two-thirds of the vote in the convention, is required for nomination.

The Bryan men say that their estimate does not exclude the New York delegation.

They say that Bryan will win by an overwhelming majority, despite all the efforts that Tammany and all others can put forth in the opposition.

MAUS SUCCEEDS GENERAL FUNSTON IN CALIFORNIA.

San Francisco, June 25.—The Examiner says today: Colonel Marion P. Maus, commanding the Twentieth Infantry, which is stationed at the Presidio at Monterey, was designated by the War Department yesterday as a temporary successor of Brigadier-General Funston as Commander of the Department of California when the latter shall be transferred to Fort Leavenworth, Kan., August 19.

NATIONAL GUARDS WILL SHOOT FOR STATE MEDALS

The annual rifle and revolver competition of the Oregon National guard will be held on the rifle range near Salem during the week of July 20 to 24 inclusive. General orders No. 9 from the office of Adjutant General W. E. Fluzer, just issued, gives full instructions to regimental, battalion and company officers as to how the competing guardsmen are to be selected, as well as a complete program of the four day's shoot. The commanding officer of each regiment will send a team of four men and one alternate to be selected from the regimental and battalion companies; from each company a team of four men and one alternate to be selected by the company commander, all to be selected by previous competition on some outdoor range in such manner as each commanding officer may deem necessary to secure the best shot of his command for the team. No guardsman will participate in the state contest unless he shall have performed not less than 75 per cent of all military duty since joining the National guard.

THE FOLLOWING MARKSMANSHIP CONTESTS WILL TAKE PLACE DURING THE FOUR DAY'S COMPETITION:

State trophy match—company championship; prize, silver cup to become the best property of the organization winning it three times, not necessarily in succession.

State medal match—Competing for state trophy; prize, a gold medal, to become the property of the officer or soldier winning it three times, not necessarily in succession. The highest individual score in the state trophy match will be awarded the prize in this contest.

State individual match—Open to all members of the national guard competing for the state trophy; prizes, (1) gold medal, two silver medals, bronze medals and a silver medal to be awarded to the following: The guardsman making the highest aggregate score in slow fire, the one making the highest score in rapid fire and the one making the highest score in skirmish fire.

Governor's trophy match—Regimental championship, open to teams of eight men from each regimental organization in the state. This trophy is to be competed for annually.

State pistol match—Open to all commissioned officers of the national guard and to all non-commissioned officers present on the range during the state competitions; prizes, a gold medal to the competitor making the highest aggregate score, and a silver medal to each of the two competitors making the highest aggregate score after the gold medal score.

At the same time of the national guard and the national rifle matches of the Oregon members of the National Rifle Association will be held on the same range. There will be two principal events, the trophy match and the national marksmanship reserve match. The usual rules will cover the two events.—Journal.

PORTLAND CONTRACTORS BID ON SWIFT PLANT.

Portland contractors are to be given the first opportunity of offering bids for the ground floor work of the Union meat company's plant, best known, perhaps as the Swift & Co. packing house, as the Swifts are heavily interested, plans for which have been completed and submitted to the several parties interested, says the Oregon Daily Journal. Blue prints of the foundations for part of the plant have been completed and work on the pilings and the stone walls to be put in will be started as soon as possible.

The first building that is to be built will be 25 stories in height and will cost something like \$200,000. Its dimensions it will be 200x130 feet with an annex of 130x75 feet. The specifications call for the completion of the main building within the next year.

While the principal building is in the course of construction the stockyards and several smaller buildings are to be erected. Among these will be the glue factory, wool battery, lumber factory and the engine room. These buildings will be two or three stories in height, 150 feet in length and 100 feet wide.

It is expected that the railroad tracks to the packing house on the peninsula will be completed within a few weeks and then it will be possible to ship all material right to the site.
