

IMPORTANT CONFERENCE AT SAGAMORE HILL

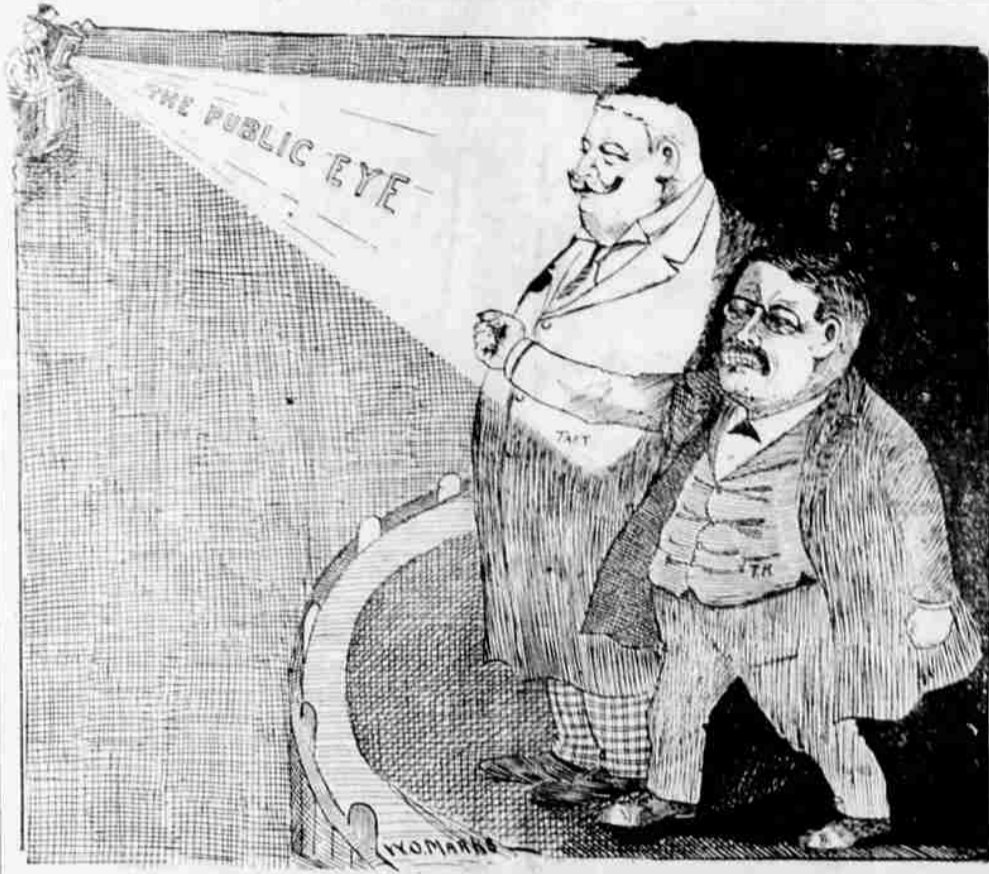

There were five passengers, two of whom were women, and none were injured.

EUGENE HOLDS ITS FIRST BIG MARKET DAY

Several thousand people from the country in the city today.

DOUBLE WEDDING IN THE EAST PARK A FEATURE OF THE OCCASION—A BIG PARADE PULLED OFF ON THE STREETS THIS AFTERNOON—HORSE SALE.

Eugene's first market day has been a success and has reflected credit upon the promoters, and the business men who have contributed funds to make it the success it has been.

The day dawned bright and clear and it was easily seen that the weather man had been kind to us. A week ago today, the date which was first advertised for market day, was just the opposite—rain fell in torrents all forenoon and it became necessary to postpone it a week. And it is well that the postponement was made. The day has been better advertised and a much larger crowd is in town than would have been last Saturday even if the weather had been good. Several thousand people from the country are here—a regular Fourth of July crowd.

The exercises of the day began with a band concert on the streets by the Eugene military band between 11 and 12 o'clock. At one-thirty this afternoon the big parade was formed at the corner of Fifth and Willamette streets and the line of march extended the length of the business portion of Willamette street and other business thoroughfares. The parade was headed by Mayor Matlock and Mr. Colgate, one of the promoters of the occasion, in a carriage. Then came little one Hudson on a beautiful horse, followed by the band. Behind the band were the two couples to be married on the platform in the east park. Then came a large number of citizens in stylish turnout and they were followed by a long string of blooded horses and cattle.
