**M'MAHON IS TO BRING SUIT AGAINST GOVERNOR**

L. H. McMahon, a Salem attorney, says that he will bring suit in Marion county, at the October term of court, against Governor Chamberlain, to recover some \$10,000 illegally taken by him during his incumbency as chief executive of the state.  
It is contended by McMahon, that he would bring suit as a private citizen bent on benevolent aims, to secure the return of the sums mentioned to the people from which they were taken contrary to the constitution of the state.  
He contends that the constitution, prior to the enactment of the flat salary law of 1905, provided that the governor should receive an annual salary of \$1,500 with no additional perquisites. The acceptance of compensation for service on the various state boards, therefore, is contrary to the constitution and illegal according to the contentions of Mr. McMahon, who contends that since he has brought suit against former secretaries of State Dunbar and Kincaid he can not as an impartial objector refrain from prosecuting Governor Chamberlain under the same line of attack.
