BOND WHOLE OF LANE COUNTY FOR HARBOR WORK

EUGENE BUSINESS MEN INTERVIEWED BY H. H. FISK FAVOR PLAN--THE WHOLE COUNTY WOULD BE BENEFITTED BY IMPROVEMENT OF SIUSLAW.

There seems to be some difference of opinion among the people of this section in regard to how large a territory should be included in the district which issues bonds for improving the Siuslaw harbor. Some are in favor of including only the territory embraced in the Siuslaw Valley. Others think the whole of Lane County should be included, as the whole of the county would be benefitted in a greater or less degree. With the harbor improved and a railroad from Eugene to Florence, Lane County would then have the choice of two routes for shipping her products to market as well as getting in supplies from other places; this would put her farmers and business men in a comparatively independent position, and give them the benefit of water transportation. H. H. Fisk, who recently spent several days at the county seat informs us that he interviewed quite a number of the business men of Eugene on the subject and that they all expressed themselves in favor of bonding the whole county. It is well known that a large number, if not a majority of the leading men of Eugene, own timber land in this valley, and are therefore, directly invested in the same way and would share in the advance in values that would be sure to follow as soon as the harbor is improved. While the people of this section are more directly interested in the matter of harbor improvement it is certain that the whole of Lane County would share in the benefits that would be derived from the work.—Florence West.

GREAT NORTHERN MINES SOLD AT SHERIFF'S SALE.

The Great Northern gold mines in the Blue River district which at one time promised to become the best paying property in the state, was sold here this morning at sheriff's sale to Colonel J. M. Williams of Eugene, acting in behalf of creditors, for \$3,875. The mines were sold on two executions from this county and one from Lane county. The mines were originally capitalized at one million dollars and residents of this city and Eugene, who believed in the property, invested to the extent of \$54,000. During the palmy days of the mines stock sold readily at 25 and 35 cents per share.—Albany Herald.
