

BARNETT GETS TEN LONG YEARS AT SAN QUENTIN

San Francisco, July 1.—Walter J. Barnett, formerly vice-president and general counsel of the Western Pacific railroad and vice-president and general counsel of the California Safe Deposit Company, which failed in this city last November for about nine million dollars, was today sentenced to San Quentin penitentiary for ten years by Superior Judge Conley.

Barnett was convicted of having hypothecated bonds and securities to the amount of \$25,000 belonging to the estate of Ellen M. Colton, of which he was special administrator. Barnett's attorneys gave notice of appeal and asked to place client on bail, pending the determination of the appeal. Judge Conley did not immediately decide the motion.

PORTLAND'S GREATEST WHEAT EXPORT YEAR.

Portland's greatest grain-exporting year ended last night. Never before in the history of the Pacific Northwest has so much been set afloat from the local harbor and the Puget Sound ports as during the cereal year ending June 30. All previous seasons have been left far behind, the greatest prior year being 1905-1906. Portland's shipment for the year just closed exceed the preceding season by more than 6,000,000 bushels. The great increase shown by the port during the past 12 months is remarkable and insures a prominent place for this city among the leading grain-shipping ports of the world.—Oregonian.

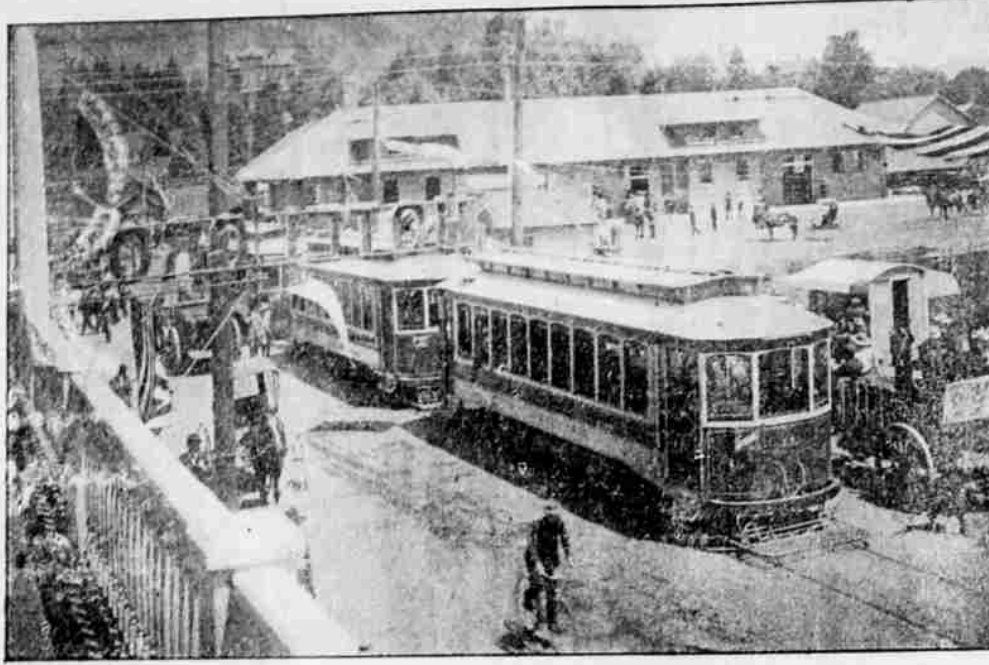

BOOTH'S ATTORNEYS ASK COURT TO ORDER ACQUITTAL

Portland, Or., July 1.—When the government rested its case in the trial of James Henry Booth, charged with having accepted an \$800 bribe from Frederick A. Kribs, land operator, for advance information from the Roseburg Land Office, this morning, Attorney L. R. Webster, for the defense, made a motion to instruct the jury to acquit, contending that the evidence submitted by the prosecution had been insufficient to convict. For an hour Judge Webster argued and when the noon recess was taken he informed the court that he would speak for half an hour more. The motion will probably be overruled by Federal Judge Wolverton, in which case Booth, the defendant, will take the stand and relate his story this afternoon.

W. J. Burns is being held by the government for rebuttal. There is a disposition to close the case by Friday, in order that witnesses and jurors may have an opportunity to be home for the fourth of July.

The government announced, after examining G. W. Kruse, O. A. Houser and Walter S. Threlkeld, who testified in selling claims to Kribs, that it would rest its case, reserving the right to put on other witnesses.

To this, Dan J. Malarkey, for the defense, objected strenuously. The prosecution explained that the witnesses it had in mind were intended to testify on certain matters, which the defense then agreed to admit, so as to save time, the testimony being of a character to support official documents. With this understanding the government rested. Before placing any witness on the stand, Webster made his motion to direct a verdict of acquittal, quoting liberal extracts from the testimony of Kribs and Bridges.

LEHIGH VIADUCT BADLY WRECKED BY DYNAMITE

Buffalo, July 1.—Two heavy charges of dynamite were exploded by a time fuse under the Lehigh viaduct at Selkirk and Perry streets, early today, and blew two heavy iron girders out of place, twisted the rails above and shattered the ties for many feet. The viaduct was recently completed by McClintock & Marshall, a firm which maintains an open shop and have had several bridges wrecked by dynamite in the past year. One arrest has been made in connection with the outrage.

LARGEST RAMBLER ROSE BUSH IN CITY.

Probably as large as any, if not the largest Rambler rose bush in Eugene is that in the front yard of the E. L. Campbell residence, Ninth and Olive streets. The bush has a spread of fifteen feet one way and about ten the other, is about twelve feet high. It is a mass of blooms from the ground to the top, with many hundred buds in reserve, yet to open. Insignificant as the individual Rambler rose is, the hundreds of clusters of scarlet spotted against the green of the leaves present a very pleasing view at a reasonable distance, even from across the street. It is like some people—will not stand close inspection. How many blooms and buds does it carry? Mr. Campbell thinks three thousand would be a very conservative estimate. The clusters carry from ten to forty flowers and buds. The symmetry of this particular bush is made possible by a young fir at the back, from which it gets support.

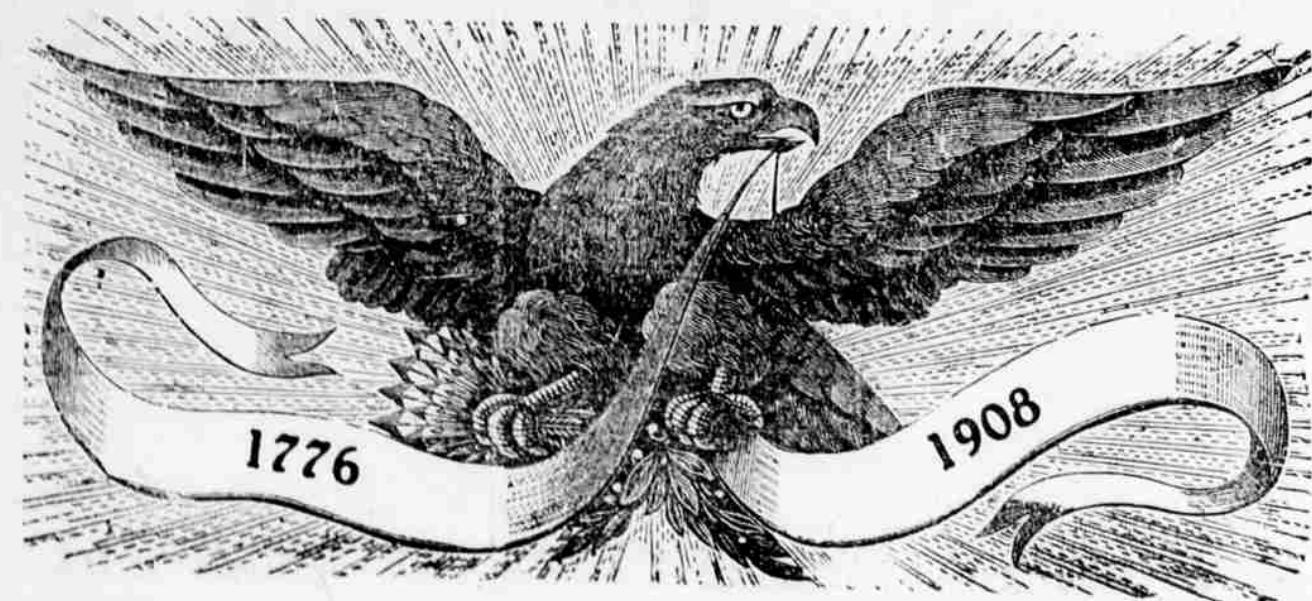
