PRUNE PACKERS ORGANIZE FOR BETTER PRICES

Salem, Or., June 29—All the prune packers of the Northwest met here tonight and organized an association for mutual protection and promotion of the interests of their business.

The organization is one that has long been desired by some of the packers, but which could never be effected heretofore for the reason that competition among packers has been too severe. In the season now about to open, the packers will work together for their common interests.

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Among the packing houses in the organization are H. S. Gile & Co., Willamette Valley Prune Association and W. C. Tillson & Co., all of Salem; the Roseburg Packing-Houses, owned by Gile & Co., and Tillson & Co.; Allen's Packing-House, of Eugene; Lang & Co., of Portland; Mason, Ehrman & Co., of Portland; French Packing Co., of Myrtle Creek and the packing house at Vancouver, Will Dictate Selling Price.

The new association has formulated two forms of contracts which all the firms in the combine will use. One contract is that to be used in selling fruit to Eastern buyers and the other in buying from local growers. The packers have determined that they will no longer sell according to forms of contract put out by Eastern buyers, but will dictate the terms of the contract or not sell at all.

The new contract contains a number of provisions favorable to Oregon packers.

It gives the packer unlimited choice in selecting an arbitrary case of dispute where, as in the past, the arbitrators have been chosen from the New York Fruit Exchange. The new contract gives the packer the privilege of filling his contracts with smaller sizes of prunes if the crop produced does not contain the required quantity of large sizes. It gives the packer the right to route the fruit in shipping. It exempts the packer from liability in case shipment is delayed by congestion of traffic.

It provides that in case of dispute as to quality, samples for test shall be taken from one-fifth of the boxes of fruit; that no allowance for short weight shall be made unless it amounts to more than one per cent, and that in the counting test the size shall include the seventh prune and not the fifth only, thus, that 47 prunes shall be deemed in the 49-50 size and not 45 only.

WEATHER SUMMARY FOR LAST WEEK

Following is the summary of weather conditions in Oregon for last week, as reported by the Oregon section of the U. S. weather bureau: The week on the whole was unfavorable on account of the wide range in temperature and the lack of sufficient moisture. The temperature in a number of counties was very close to the frost mark on the mornings of the 27th and 28th. During the opening and closing days of the week high temperatures prevailed and the winds were moderately strong and very drying.

Light rain fell during the middle of the week in a number of counties but none of consequence was reported in any of the eastern counties and the drought in the latter district is becoming more and more serious as the season advances.

Light hail fell in Gilliam and Umatilla counties on one or two days. The sunshine during the week was nearly normal.

INJURED IN COLLAPSE OF ROSEBURG BUILDING.

With a series of rumbling crashes that could be heard for two or three blocks away, the greater part of the north wall of the brick building housing the crockery and hardware department of the Max Welles' grocery, collapsed during the noon hour today. Fortunately, no one was hurt. Two hours later an overhanging portion of the wall fell, inflicting serious, but not necessarily fatal injuries upon a workman named Harrington. The collapse of the wall is attributed to a weakening of the foundation by the abutting excavation for a building to be erected for George Kohlhaugen, by M. W. Aldrich, whose crew of men Harrington had joined only yesterday.

Harrington was engaged in picking articles of crockery and hardware out of the debris when the misfortune overtook him. A jagged mass of bricks from overhead suddenly crashed down upon him and without warning, and when fellow workmen reached him a moment later he was insensible. He was placed on a cot and carried to his room at Mrs. Bell Collins' lodging house, where Doctors Hoover and Seely attended him. Harrington was found to have sustained two fractures of the skull, one at the top and the other at the base, and also an injury to the spine, indicated by a deeply discolored spot.
