GREAT SCARCITY OF HARD WALL PLASTER

GASOLINE TRACTION ENGINE RECEIVED

A big gasoline traction engine arrived here this morning by freight for the Berger-Bean Hardware Co., having been ordered from the International Harvester Co. The machine is for S. W. Miles, a prosperous farmer who some time ago purchased the Volney Hemenway farm, five miles west of Eugene. He will use it to do general power work, including the operation of a threshing, and will take it to his Marlon county farm where he will operate his clover huller with it. This is the first traction gasoline engine ever brought to Lane county. They ought to prove popular, as there is no danger of fire in the harvest fields with them. Every year there is a report of one or more threshing outfits being burned in this county, having caught fire from sparks from the steam engines. The Berger-Bean company will use the engine in the Fourth of July parade, to pull their float.

HOW KIDNAPPED GIRL WAS RESCUED.

Coalinga, Cal., July 1.—Tony Lovell, the leader of the kidnaping yesterday of Edna Domengise, the 18-year-old daughter of Adolph Domengise, is at bay today in Western canyon, 15 miles from here. He is surrounded by a posse of determined men, heavily armed, and his death or capture is expected to be reported at any time.

Edna, the girl who underwent the tragic experience, is at home today, suffering from nervousness and slight bruises, but not seriously injured in any way. Her feet were badly cut by stones when she was forced to walk over rocky roads, her sole garment being the night dress which she wore when dragged from her father's house.

Captured in Lonely Canyon.
Cleve Rogers, the younger kidnaper, who was captured last night by a posse, after being traced to a lonely mountain cabin, and after using the girl as a shield against bullets from his pursuers, is in jail here. Feeling against him does not run high, as the girl says he offered her no indignity. A pathetic feature of the remarkable case is the fact that one of the leaders of the posse which captured Rogers was his own father. The old man had no idea that it was his son whom he was following with a gun, and when he saw the boy collapsed.

The resentment of the community is directed against Lovell, who is alleged to have planned the kidnaping and the burning of the outhouses on the Domengise place.

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EUGENE'S POSTAL RECEIPTS INDICATE GROWTH OF CITY

The Eugene postoffice, gained in its receipts during the quarter ending June 30, 1908, \$1735.57 over the corresponding quarter in 1907, from the reports of Postmaster Page. The total receipts for the quarter this year were \$6444.85 while those in 1907 were \$4809.28. This is a gain of 35 per cent on the 1907 total.

The receipts were mostly from stamp sales, there being but slightly over \$300 from other sources. Something like \$3000 was transferred from the Postal department to the Money Order department, showing the profit approximately of the postoffice here to the government.

This may be taken as an indication of the rapid growth of the city.
