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INVESTIGATING SPRINGFIELD'S WATER SUPPLY

Investigations has been made by members of the Springfield City Council, during the past week, regarding the condition of the water furnished the city by the Willamette Valley Co., says the News. It is reported to the News by one of the investigating committee that water is being pumped from the mill race instead of the wells, thus giving the citizens nothing more nor less than river water, and the most impure kind at that. The reservoir on the hill was also examined, and found to be anything but in a sanitary condition. A slimy scum covered the surface and gave the appearance of a contaminated frog pond. It conditions are as reported to us, the franchise granted this company under the ordinance is of no force or effect at the present time. Under the present condition the city council can invalidate the franchise at any time should they so desire. The ordinance plainly says that should the Willamette Valley company, its successors and assigns fail to supply the inhabitants of Springfield with pure and wholesome water within 12 months from the date of the ordinance, then it shall be of no force. It is also required by the ordinance that proper precaution be taken by screen wire and other means, to keep animals, birds and bugs, from having access to or getting into the water in the reservoir, which precaution has in no way been taken. Even the wells at the pumping station are open and there is nothing to prevent squirrels, rats or other animals or other insects from entering. In our judgment the city water as furnished is unfit for domestic use and immediate steps should be taken by our city authorities to see that the city is furnished with a supply of pure water. If it can be had in no other way let the city purchase the water system and then connect with the Eugene pipe line, as it will pass through Springfield, thus giving the pure, unadulterated water. The city is large enough now, to consider municipal ownership and until we own our own water system we will always experience the same difficulty and just so long are we in danger of disastrous effects.

REPORT SHOWS FORTY-ONE BIRTHS TEN DEATHS

Dr. J. W. Harris' report for the health of Lane County during June shows that there were 41 births and 10 deaths. Of the births, 26 were females and 15 males. Six of the deaths were males and four females. The causes of death are assigned as follows: senility, 1; embolism, 1; accidental poisoning, 2; chronic nephritis, 1; pneumonia, 1; membranous croup, 2; cancer of the bronchus group, 2; cancer of the face, 1; necrosis of parietal bones, 1; no cause assigned, 1. The contagious diseases were four in number, small pox, 2; typhoid fever, 1; tuberculosis, 1.
