THREE MONTHS WORK YET ON DEPOT GROUNDS

WORK OF FILLING IN EAST END OF THE YARDS HAS BEEN COMPLETED AND PARKING WILL SOON COMMENCE—MOVE FREIGHT WAREHOUSE WITHIN FEW DAYS.

Section Foreman Strawn, of the Southern Pacific Company, who has charge of the work of improving the local depot grounds, today informed a Guard reporter that the filling in of the yards in the east end is completed and he will at once put his force of men to work leveling off that portion of the yards preparatory to parking it. No more gravel will be brought here for several weeks, until the old passenger and old freight depots are moved to a permanent location in the west end of the yards and the warehouses are moved to the north side of the tracks. This will be done as soon as the new passenger depot is ready for occupancy, which will be shortly before the first of August. The freight and old passenger depots will be combined into one large freight depot and will be located near the end of Charleton street. The work of moving the freight depot will begin in about ten days. The old side-track that extends along the south side of the yards will at once be taken up as that the two buildings may be moved to their new location across which the track is laid. All the freight cars loaded with merchandise will be sidetracked at the west end of the new track that is being built along the stock yards, and which will be connected within a few days with the old track that now extends along the yards. A place to unload the cars is now being prepared. All drays and other freight hauling vehicles will enter the yards to load freight from the cars by way of Lincoln street, in the vicinity of the Warren Construction Company's paving plant, and when they wish to secure freight from the depot they will go in by way of Charleton street, that thoroughfare ending at the railroad.

Foreman Strawn stated that the Pollock Transfer Company intends to build soon a large new warehouse on the depot grounds. It will be located about where the driveway to the McMurry residence extends

and 25 feet west of the Dunn warehouse. It will have a frontage on the railroad of 30 feet.

Parking Will Be Beautiful
Mr. Strawn showed the reporter a rough sketch of the proposed parking around the new passenger depot and in the east end of the yards. According to the plans the parking will be very beautiful when completed. There will be a circular driveway south of the depot to allow teams to approach the baggage room and the Wells-Fargo building, and in the centre there will be a large plot of lawn set to flowers and shrubs. The entire east end of the yards, where there will be no driveway, will be similarly treated. The remaining portion of the yards will also be nicely parked

when the buildings are all moved to their permanent locations and when the filling is completed.

Three Months' Work Yet
The sum of \$19,000 was set aside by the company for these improvements, and it is being expended carefully and judiciously by Foreman Strawn. He says that there will be three months' work yet on the grounds before the sum is used up, and when it is completed Eugene will have the handsome depot grounds in the state.

SHIPPERS OF LUMBER REQUIRED TO STAKE CARS

Washington, D. C., July 7.—"We find and decide upon all the facts and circumstances disclosed by our investigation that the regulations of the railroads, which require shippers of lumber on open cars to stake and secure their loads for safe carriage, are not unjust or unreasonable."

This opinion of the Interstate commerce commission in the car-stake case was rendered by Chairman Knapp today.

ABE RUEF GIVEN LIBERTY ON BIG BOND

San Francisco, July 6.—Abraham Ruef was released from the county jail tonight on bonds aggregating \$1,500,000, the largest amount ever given in a criminal case in this state. This sum is the aggregate bid upon 78 indictments, returned by the Oliver grand jury, charging Ruef with bribing the former board of super-

visors in connection with the granting of franchises to public service corporations and upon which he was taken in custody by the prosecution as a sort of "prisoner of state." In charge of an escort appointed by Judge Frank H. Dunne and a half dozen private guards, at an expense of about \$100 a month.

In Jail Seven Months
Since January 19, when the new administration went into office, Ruef has been languishing in the county jail.

Twenty societies, including Ruef's father and sister and himself, staked the bonds. It developed today during the examination of his sureties before Superior Judge Frank J. Murphy, that Ruef owned real estate in this city, which he recently transferred to his father and sister, upon which a real estate expert on the witness stand placed a value of \$1,095,366.

Ruef's Privately Income.
Ruef's annual income from this

property was \$75,900. His father and sister went his bonds to the amount of \$690,000, while other sureties qualified for \$870,000. Of the latter Joseph Hirsch and Leopold Hirsch signed five bonds for \$20,000 each, Louis Friedman six bonds of \$20,000 each, and a surety company deposited a certified check for \$100,000, equivalent to \$200,000 in bonds.

COMMITTEE PASSES UPON MANY CONTESTS

associates. Senator Fred T. Duhal was sustained by the sub-committee which heard the Mormon contests from Idaho, but the committee was not ready to make its report to the full committee before that body adjourned. Tom Johnson, of Cleveland, was a winner in the Nineteenth Ohio district, where he triumphed over the sub-committee before the national committee. The Rockwell delegates were displaced and the two Johnson delegates seated in their places. In the ninth Ohio district the Garber faction retained the two contestants over the protest of Johnson.

McCarren's Abuse Choked Off.
Patrick McCarren, of Brooklyn, was practically ignored in his contest against Charles F. Murphy for the 12 seats in Kings county, New York. Before the sub-committee he became so abusive of the Murphy-Culer men that he was not permitted to proceed, and the meeting was abruptly adjourned, with the decision to take no further action with respect to the contests. The full committee sustained this course without delay.

In the District of Columbia contest, where the entire delegation of six members was involved, the committee divided the seats between the two contesting parties.

Joseph Howley, of the Thirty-first Pennsylvania district, whose right to his seat was disputed by the Guffey people, was sustained by the sub-committee. The Pennsylvania contests, which involved eight seats in the city of Philadelphia and three in Allegheny county, provoked probably the most bitter discussion that was heard before any of the sub-committees.

Bitter Fight on Keystone State.
Charles Berwood Daly, of Philadelphia, appeared before the committee and arraigned Charles P. Donnelly and Thomas J. Ryan, the leaders of the Guffey faction in the district, in the bitterest terms. He charged that the eight Guffey delegates were elected by the aid of Republicans, and that the rankest frauds were perpetrated. Both Mr. Donnelly and Mr. Ryan, who spoke in support of the regular delegations, replied in kind to the charges.

After listening to the examinations and recriminations for an hour and a

half, the sub-committee took the contests under advisement and will report tomorrow morning. Leaders of several of the contesting delegations, incensed by their defeat, charged that the sub-committees were packed against them. Little hope was expressed by the opponents of Mr. Sullivan, Mr. Guffey and Mr. Murphy that they would win before the national committee.
