WATER BONDS ARE NOT YET DISPOSED OF

COUNCIL MET LAST NIGHT AND OPENED BIDS, BUT NO ACTION WAS TAKEN—ANOTHER MEETING WILL BE HELD TONIGHT—OTHER BUSINESS TRANSACTIONS.

The city council met last night for the purpose of opening the bids on the \$200,000 water bonds recently voted by the people. There were three bids, from the following: One from H. H. Rollins, Rhodes, Sinkler & Butcher and Morris Bros., another from S. A. Keas and the third from the Willamette Valley Company. The bid of the first named was at par with a commission of one and one-half per cent; that of Keas was at par with a commission of 15,000, and that of the Willamette Valley Company was for \$149,000 of the bonds in payment for the water plant now owned by the company, the bonds to be taken at par with a commission. As the city charter provides that the bonds cannot be sold at less than par, two of the bids with the commission being less than par, the matter was taken under advisement and postponed until a meeting tonight.

Other Business Transacted.
The ordinance for the erection of a pressed steel building by F. L. Chambers for an automobile garage was brought up and defeated by a vote of 5 to 3.
The matter of the hay scales which the Bangs Livery Company have erected on West Ninth street was brought up and it was agreed that

they should be allowed to remain there until September 1 and then removed.
The city recorder was directed to advertise for bids for paving the park streets.

The matter of opening Olive street north from West Fifth street to the depot grounds was ordered investigated.

CARS RUN TO JUDKINS POINT BY SATURDAY

A. Welch returned to Portland today, after having been here to look after the matter of the sale of the city's bonds for the purchase of his company's waterworks. He stated to a reporter at the train that his company is ready to turn the plant over to the city just as soon as the bonds are disposed of and the city is ready.

In speaking of the construction of the Eugene-Springfield trolley line he stated that the trestle work would be completed in about two weeks and the work of building the bridge across the Willamette would begin immediately thereafter. The crossing frogs are being put in at the intersection of the electric line with the S. P. tracks at the end of East Thirteenth street today, and the cars will be running to Judkins' Point probably by Saturday.

CONTRACTOR CHEZEM ARRESTED FOR ASSAULT

WAIVED EXAMINATION THIS AFTERNOON AND BOUND OVER TO CIRCUIT COURT FOR TRIAL.

John R. Chezem, the Springfield contractor who built the three-story Coleman block and who has the contract for building the two-story addition to L. H. Smith's brick building, was arrested this afternoon by Constable Plank on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon upon John Berkshire, alleged to have been committed at Creswell on July 2. He appeared before Justice of the Peace Bryson soon after his arrest and waived examination. He was bound over to the circuit court at his bond fixed at \$100. Chezem is building the new Odd Fellows' hall at Creswell and at the time of the alleged assault was engaged in a dispute with Berkshire, who is a resident of that place.
